

Fine example of Craftsman Style. The street reflects Olmsted's philosophy regarding roadways within a subdivision; the street is a broad, long roadway with no intersecting thoroughfares, running east to west "with no special directness toward the town". The streets picturesque character is a plan Olmsted envisioned for the roadways surrounding the Park. The large lots and relative seclusion of the street were viewed as essential advantages for surburban living. The street takes its name from James Tillinghast, owner of the property up until July 15, 1889 when it was conveyed to George L. Thorne and Byron Angell, to be subdivided for residential use. The subdivision named "Meadow View Park" carried restrictive covenants in the deeds of sale.
