

House is located two blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.
18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story. Front facing gable roof. Full-width porch has square doric supports. Spindle balustrade. Glass paneled door with leaded sidelights. Tri-part first floor window, single light center with leaded transom. 1/1 sidelights. Second floor semi-hexagonal bay with 1/1 windows. Six-light porch door. Hip roof dormer projects from hip extension. Three 1/1 windows. 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1909

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A typical gabled frame Buffalo residence. Crescent Avenue is the longest curvilinear street in the Parkside subdivision, stretching from Humboldt Avenue to Colvin Street. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent Avenue had been modified by Olmsted to its current form. Portions of the street were deeded to the city by five different owners over a span of five years, beginning in 1887 near Humboldt and ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins and ends within the Parkside subdivision, following Olmsted's rule that a suburban neighborhood street "not lead with special directness toward the town."
