# Mozart still lives at 250

The Buffalo Gay Men's Chorus will be among of the first cultural organizations in the area to help celebrate the birthday of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, born on January 27, 1756.

In 1791, the last year of his life, Mozart composed a little cantata to celebrate his Masonic Lodge's new facility, dedicated to the ideals of brotherhood. He completed the work on November 15 and conducted the first performance three days later. Sadly, it was to be his last work. Mozart died just two weeks later on December 4. He was only 35 years old.

As with other compositions for Masonic ritual, Mozart wrote a fairly straight forward part for men's chorus. Many of the melodic phrases contain a frequent Masonic symbol, two notes, usually eights, slurred together as a suggestion of the bond between two friends.

For the January concerts, audiences will hear the opening chorus, tenor/bass recitative, a duet for tenor and bass, and a final chorus.

There has been some unsubstantiated talk among musicologists that Mozart may have composed this piece as a way of apologizing to his brother Masons for giving away so many Masonic secrets in his opera "The Magic Flute." On January 20 or 21, 2006 BGMC audiences will have a chance to decide for themselves.



The Clara String Quartet, founded in 2002 by four Buffalo Philharmonic musicians and friends, has a strong commitment to sharing the string quartet repertoire with audiences throughout Western New York. Named after the famed composer and pianist, Clara Schumann, the quartet has appeared as soloists with the Buffalo Philharmonic at many venues throughout Buffalo. # A Conversation with Kathleen Bryce-Niles

Her current project is lining up corporate sponsors.

Kathleen has such a way with words! Her missives to the guys and the board always brim over with such witticisms and verbal hugs that we are always happy to open up her emails, as well as welcome her to rehearsals. Recently, I spoke with Kathleen about what she is like when not on the job. Here's what she said:

### M: What would you like to do if you could have another go-round with life?

K: I would like to work in musical comedy. I did a stand up gig for Last Comic Standing Buffalo and that was very challenging and delightful. The audience was comprised of twenty-somethings, the rest of the comics were semi-pros or pros and all were "blue" while I was grandma doing my church shtick. They were very kind to me.

#### M: Tell me something that somebody said to you that really stuck in your brain for all your life?

K: My dad was my font of wisdom: "You make enough mistakes in your right mind, imagine what you would do if you drink." "Big Shot is very expensive." "If it isn't yours, don't take it." "If you ever think you are better than the next guy, you won't be." The list goes on.

#### M: Describe what music means to you.

K: Music is intrinsic to my well-being. While I cannot play an instrument or even read music, I write music constantly. Most is lost to the wind but since I learned that Paul McCartney is in a similarly challenged situation, I have been inspired to begin to get it written by those who can transcribe from a hum or whistle. It is very cool after having lost thousands of songs to hear one played at long last.

#### M: Do you have a favorite poem?

K: As the Editor Emerita of The Comstock Review, I cannot afford to have found my favorite yet. Each year, we award thousands in prizes to fine poets from all over the English-speaking world.

M: What kinds of hobbies do you have?

K: I love art. So, I have determined that one cannot love as much as I do and not have some talent somewhere. After some failed experimentation, I have discovered Altered Books which combines words and artwork. It is great fun and I am currently working on a book of pages from the NY Times which I have retitled, "Changing History One Page at a Time."

M: What are you most proud of in your life's accomplishments? K: I am most proud of my work with thousands of students as teacher and administrator in an urban district for 31 years. My

last position was as the Principal of the only school in the United States (at that time) which was an alternative to expulsion for weapons possession.

M: In addition to Debi Overton's (your partner's) incredible piano skills which initially brought you to the BGMC, what part of the BGMC do you admire the most?

K: It is the stellar manner in which the gentlemen of the chorus have moved from a bunch of amateurs who like to sing to a cohesive, professional chorus that can stand against any in the country that keeps me coming back. As a woman, I am very impressed that the BGMC has chosen an amazingly gifted conductor in Barbara Wagner and one the country's finest accompanists in Debi Overton to guide them into excellence. It takes great men to recognize great women and to share the stage with them. BGMC is to be commended for such character.


#### M: Do you have any final words of wisdom about the chorus and your part in it?

A native of Puerto Rico, Ramón came to Buffalo in 1976. He's worn many professional hats and is now a counselor for the New York State Smokers' Quitline based at Roswell Park Cancer

Ramón has had a great time singing the entire BGMC repertoire for the past five years. "I enjoyed performing 'The Rhythm of Life' because it's so upbeat and funky. I enjoy performing 'Non Nobis Domine' because of its majesty. I'm not a very religious person but it just moves me in a spiritual way."

#### What if there was no BGMC?

"There would be a tremendous void in my life. I have many strong friendships that I wouldn't have it if weren't for the chorus. We see each other every week and when on the outside we greet each other, it's like running in to a member of the family. We belong to a group that's more than just a social outlet. We have a bond. I feel like I belong to a group that's on the same page as I am within the gay community."

Donning their tuxedoes and warming up their vocal chords, the singers arrived bright and early on a chilly Friday morning. From the first song to the last, the audience was enthralled. Applause could not have been more sincere nor attention more perfect. From the opening processional, "Antya Laba," an African gathering song, the warmth and generous spirit of the chorus and the students filled the auditorium.

Heather Jenkins, Diversity Coordinator at Nichols, wrote to the BGMC after the concert and noted: "As issues of sexual identity, in particular misconceptions about sexual identity are common among teenagers, your song selections and physical demeanor certainly helped to dispel myths and open eyes."

Our Barbara Wagner spent the majority of her teaching career at Nichols. It was thrilling for her to return as the Artistic Director of the BGMC and to receive such a rousing welcome from her colleagues, as well as the students, who remembered her with great affection. Perhaps you can go home again.

Ms. Jenkins commended those members of the BGMC who agreed to stay for a conversation with the students..."what I believe to be one of the most powerful dialogue sessions in our school's

history. The students were engaged, enlightened, and genuinely moved by the unwavering honesty and compassion of those who trusted us enough to share their personal thoughts and journeys. The students took the experience to heart and shared it with their peers; many have expressed interest in our upcoming Gay/Straight Alliance, as they are committed to awareness, action, and empowerment."

A major component of the BGMC mission is to educate as well as to entertain. It was our pleasure to share time with these outstanding Western New York youth.





Very early in the morning of November 4, 2005 we sang for a packed auditorium of students and faculty at the Nichols School (see the article "BGMC performs at Nichols School" in this issue). That very same evening found us at Fredonia State College singing for the second time in as many years at their Diversity/ Multicultural Celebration. The next evening, we mingled with the throngs in the Statler Towers Golden Ballroom (talk about memories) as we joined with our beloved community at Cause for Celebration and sang a few of our tried and true standards.

November 27, 2005 we did a lively benefit concert for AIDS Family Services at First Presbyterian Church with David Bond, host organist.

My goodness - we're just a little tired, but not too tired to launch into intense rehearsals for our lovely winter concert, "A Winter's Tale." I love rehearsals - the humor, the intensity, the strength and connectedness of our family and the sounds I hear that are often so beautiful they make me breathless. In fact, he wrote it for the dedication of a Masonic Hall in Vienna. We offer this to you as our tribute to the prodigious Mozart on the occasion of the 250th anniversary of his birth.

The brilliant Clara String Quartet, comprised of Amy Glidden, Betsy Holzemer, Jackie Galluzzo, and Amelee Fradette (all BPO players) will be playing with us as well. You'll hear a beautiful Hebrew Chant, arranged by Cantor David Goldstein, that cries out for peace in our fractured world. And of course, we can't let the season and the theme go by without doing a few saucy songs like "Sleigh Ride," complete with bells and whips and whinnies, "Baby, It's Cold Outside," and the wonderful Cole Porter tune, "It's too Darn Hot/Cold."

I hope you've all seen "Rent." What a glorious movie. I'm pleased to tell you that there will be three songs from "Rent" on this concert as well. The rest will be a surprise!

And so the fine men of the BGMC and I wish you the happiest and healthiest of New Years. Thank you for being there for all of us as we continue to fulfill the promise of our mission. The poet Elinor Wylie invites us to "walk in the white snow in a soundless space---at a tranquil pace." I pray that we can all find some time to do just that this winter.
