

#### Once Upon a Time Christopher S. Babbitt, President



According to the Oxford English Dictionary, "Once upon a time" is a stock phrase that has been used in some form since at least 1380 in storytelling in the English language. It seems to have become a widely accepted convention for opening oral narratives by around 1600. These stories often end with "...and they lived happily ever after," originally, "happily until their deaths." These are examples of the narrative

form, and occur most frequently in the narratives produced for children aged between six and eight.

"Once upon a time" is particularly apparent in fairytales for younger children, where it is almost always the opening line of a tale. It is commonly used in the original translations of the stories of Charles Perrault, Hans Christian Andersen and the Brothers Grimm. The phrase is also frequently used in oral storytelling, such as retellings of myths, fables, and folklore.

BGMC has taken a different spin on "Once upon a time." We are using it in our oral storytelling through singing. The concert you are about to hear is very near and dear to our hearts. There are bits of this concert that will sadden, frighten and even inspire you. This is the story of our lives. This music is a way for us to share with you, our loyal patrons, what we felt, dealt with, and eventually ended up with throughout our lives. With 70+ men in our chorus, the entire story is not entirely ours, but each and every man singing before you tonight has experienced or lived through one or more of these songs and emotions.

BGMC is honored and humbled by the support we have received over the past nine years. We look to you, our family and friends, for our strength. We hope you enjoy our fairytale (pardon the pun) of **ONCE UPON A TIME**. Please join us after the show for our reception and feel free to pick up a copy of one of the many BGMC CD's we have for sale.

#### Once Upon a Time Barbara Wagner, Artistic Director



For many years now, I've wanted to work with my beloved BGMC on a program we would call "Once Upon a Time." In my mind, it would be a musical tale of their lives as gay men. There would be stoles on which they could tell their stories in pictures or symbols. I'd seen those on the Heartland Gay Men's Chorus in Kansas City at a conference and loved them. We would have baby pictures in the program. The carefully chosen music would tell the stories of their lives.

Pretty tall order for a straight woman who had never trod any of the paths that gay men take during the course of their lives. But, I DID have my own path that took me to this family of men that I have come to love like grandsons, sons and brothers. I have listened to happy stories of new relationships and have wept as I held them and listened to the sad stories of the loss of a beloved partner or family member or friend. The hurt and pain that this family of men endure is almost beyond description - fear, hatred, cruel gossip, physical violence, the pain of illness, loss of family and friends, who cannot accept their life style, not even a way to be legally married or think about equal rights - it goes on and on. I guess I felt that I needed for you, our loyal and true audience, to understand even just a little of what I've been privileged to see and feel. And then there's the unbounded joy - the sons and daughters of "my boys" that I've been blessed to meet, the parents, sisters, brothers and friends who have not only loved them, but maybe even loved them a little more. We meet each other on the street and there's always a big hug. We sing our songs with such warmth and understanding that sometimes I can hardly believe it. I see tears and smiles and I know why. I know the hilarity that exists when we sit and tell outrageous stories and we laugh at ourselves, and laugh at me when I inadvertently say something that's outrageously inappropriate. These past nine years have been the best time of my long life and I want to thank all of you, the members of our devoted audiences, for being around, showing up at all of our concerts and having extraordinary faith in what we do. None of this would happen without you, as I've said many times. We are so grateful for your loving presence and support.

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#### Music Notes

#### Phil Revekant, Jimmy Rigo, Jason Ward and Barbara Wagner

#### Bonse Aba

Loosely translated from the original Chibemba language, "all that sing have the right to be called children of God" is the perfect sentiment for a processional for a big choral production. Chibemba is the language spoken primarily in Zambia. Many of the words have multiple meanings and can vary depending on the context. This translation is intended to convey the broad meaning of the piece. You may feel like dancing in the aisles. Feel free to do just that!

#### **Family**

From the Broadway musical and film of the same name, "Dreamgirls," this song exemplifies what it means to be a part of the Buffalo Gay Men's Chorus for many members. It speaks to the special relationship that we've formed over the years we've sung together. It is indeed more than any one of us individually, because we are a family.

#### Drama Queen

We all know one, and it is not a requirement that you be gay to be one. To quote Eric Lane Barnes, the composer of this piece, "I think everyone can relate to someone being a drama queen, someone who absolutely has to have their own way and has to have everything revolve around them, or they throw a fit."

#### He Ain't Heavy, He's My Brother

Here we are taking on the 1969 hit by The Hollies. This was during the "Flower Power" and "Peace and Love" era. Many people were protesting and dying in the Vietnam War. And now, in 2010, we're still fighting for basically the same things, including equal rights for all. This song is ageless.

#### The Last Song

Elton John wrote this heartbreaking song in memory of the life of Ryan White, who died of AIDS. The two became close friends as the 18 year old Ryan's life slowly ebbed away. The song was used during a closing montage featuring people who died of AIDS in the film, "The Band Played On." It tells of an estranged father coming to his dying son's bedside in the last days of his life. This is an amazing father and son song if there ever was one. It appears that Elton John and his father were, indeed, virtually estranged themselves.



#### In Remembrance

One of Eleanor Daley's best known works, "In Remembrance," comes from her Requiem which won the 1994 National Choral Award for Outstanding Composition of the Year by the Association of Canadian Choral Conductors. Known for her rich imagination and lyricism, Daley arranges her scores to be pleasing to both singers and audiences.

#### **Rainbow Connection**

This song was made famous by none other than Kermit the Frog in the opening number of the 1979 film, "The Muppet Movie." It speaks to persevering and keeping the faith on one's journey through life.

#### To Singing

With music by Karl Logue and lyrics by George Klawitter, "To Singing" pays homage to choral singers and the power of singing in a chorus. The opening words are, "When music saves a hidden soul, the boy becomes a man. Then all the hurts of yesterday dissolve as best they can." This beautiful language attests to the strength and fierce loyalty of a brotherhood of song.

#### You Raise Me Up

Most recognized for recordings by vocalist Josh Groban, "You Raise Me Up" was written by Secret Garden's Rolf Lovland (music) and novelist Brendan Graham (lyrics). "You Raise Me Up" was originally written as an instrumental piece entitled "Silent Story" with the melody based on the beautiful "Londonderry Air." It was released on the 2002 Secret Garden album called "Once in a Red Room." The song has been covered over 125 times.

#### **Both Ways**

This simple little song is about two teenage friends (?) with rather complex stories to tell. The young men, one who is gay, and the other, who is questioning, don't quite know how to "be." One treats his "friend" very rudely and coldly when they are among their friends, but when they are alone, it's a different story. It's hard to be a teenager under any circumstances, but these young men seem to find it very difficult. Wonder why????!! Our dear friend and one of our favorite composers, Marty Wimmer, composed this song that is truly not so simple at all!

#### **Nine Hundred Miles**

A long-forgotten newsworthy event is thought to have inspired this song. The lyrics invite us to wonder, who is singing? Who wrote the letter and what does it say? Why are there tears in the singer's eyes? While leaving the particulars to our imagination, the song succeeds in capturing the mood and the spirit of life on the American railroad in the early twentieth century.

#### To A Stranger

Marty Wimmer also composed the music for this song and chose the stirring poetry of Walt Whitman's "To A Stranger" for the lyrics. In the lines of the poem, Whitman indicates that strangers might be able to become intimate and affectionate friends. The stranger is a dream like symbol of the sense of intimacy and joy imagined as he passes by. "You give me the pleasure of your eyes.... You give me the pleasure of your face."

#### Born of the Sun

David Brunner, imaginative composer, dynamic conductor and inspired teacher, is the composer of "Born of the Sun." Stephen Spender's poem, "I Think Continually of Those Who Were Truly Great," reminds us of ambition, striving, passion and spirit. It speaks in a larger context about all of those "born of the sun" who wear at their hearts, at the fire's center, whose passion leaves the "vivid air signed with their honor." The music is filled with fanfares, joyous with the majesty of a life well spent, but with lyricism and warmth as well. The poem is my favorite poem ever and David Brunner honors the words with some of the most powerful music I've ever heard.

#### Last Letter Home

Jesse Givens, Private First Class, U.S. Army, died at the age of 34 in Iraq on May 1, 2003 in the service of his country. He wrote a letter to his wife, Melissa, his five-year-old son, Dakota (nicknamed "Toad") and his unborn child, Carson (nicknamed "Bean"). He asked Melissa not to open the envelope unless he was killed. "Please, only read it if I don't come home," he wrote. "Please put it away and hopefully you will never have to read it."

#### Ain't No Turnin' Back On This Road

This song was originally commissioned by the Seattle Men's Chorus. David Maddux delivers a roaring anthem for justice and truth, which we continue to seek in this world. There is a religious undertone that reminds one of the Crusades. He bands the chorus together at the beginning of the piece with a unison march-like line which slowly divides into four part harmony and echoes to mimic the strides made toward the "golden prize."

#### Walk Hand In Hand

This is a beautiful ballad, written in 1956 by Johnny Cowell. It was a decent selling single for crooner Tony Martin, hitting #10 on the charts. It's the perfect fit for a full men's chorus, as you'll hear when you listen to BGMC singing this fantastic love song. It sounds as good today as it did more than 50 years ago.



#### Amor de mi Alma

Z. Randall Stroope is widely known as a conductor, lecturer and composer. Choral groups under his direction have taken more than 60 national and international tours. He annually conducts several all-states, as well as appearances in Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center and summer festivals in Europe. One of the finest of the Spanish Renaissance poets, Garcilaso de la Vega, wrote the poem "Amor de mi Alma." De la Vega called it "Soneto V," a simple title for a poem full of brilliant words of great love, which was later set to some of the most beautiful choral music ever written.

#### A Love That Will Never Grow Old

From the movie Brokeback Mountain, "A Love That Will Never Grow Old" was composed by Gustavo Santaolalla with lyrics by Bernie Taupin. The song won the Golden Globe Award in 2006, the Satellite Award and the Internet Movie Award for best original song. When nominated for an Academy Award for best original song, sadly or unfairly (it depends on your point of view) it was rejected as ineligible because it was not prominently featured in Brokeback Mountain.

#### Save The Last Dance For Me

Many cover versions of this wonderful old song have been made over the years. Now, BGMC is tackling this "old chestnut" in a great new arrangement for men's chorus. One of the guys depicted in the song begs his date to have a lot of fun, do anything you want.... But please, above all, save the last dance for me.

#### Somebody To Love

From the 1975 album, "A Night at the Opera," by the English rock band "Queen," this gospel-influenced song is about faith, desperation and soul searching. "Queen" multi-tracked their voices for the recording to create the impression of a hundred-voice gospel choir. We've decided that we're close enough to that number to go for it.



Historically, gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgendered (GLBT) people have seldom had a "voice," a comprehensive, recognized presence with full participation in the American culture. Today, however, GLBT choruses are flourishing. The Gay and Lesbian Association of Choruses (GALA), the national support organization for GLBT singing groups, celebrated its 25th anniversary in 2008. The passage of New York State's Sexual Orientation Non-Discrimination Act (SONDA) and the rising success of the Buffalo Gay Men's Chorus are just two examples of many developments changing history for the better.

The BGMC idea was first conceived in 1999. Guided by Roger Parris (still one of our singers), a vigorous group of men worked throughout the coming year to make the BGMC organization a reality. With the support of the Rochester Gay Men's Chorus to encourage them, a steering committee consisting of a dozen dedicated members had written the by-laws and incorporation papers, held fundraisers for seed money, agreed on a mission statement, elected officers and directors and (after a thorough search) hired Barbara Wagner as BGMC's Artistic Director. She, in turn, arranged the appointment of Debi Overton as our charter accompanist. Both women are highly respected musicians. Barbara Wagner is now one of only two female conductors of over 150 gay men's choruses in the United States and Canada.

Auditions were held in May 2001, with 36 chorus members on board after the first day. Soon, there were over 50. Rehearsals began on September 11, 2001, a day of shock and sadness throughout our land. The difficult decision to go forward with the rehearsal, despite the tragedy of that day, proved to have been wise. Forty men, many not knowing each other, gathered in an eerie silence. As they and Ms. Wagner held hands for the first time in a community circle, there were anguished murmurs of meditation, grief and prayer. They sang ... ("From you I receive, to you I give, together we share and from this we live"). They learned that long-lived and classic American hymn, "How Can I Keep From Singing?". It remains to this day the Chorus theme song and a continuing reminder for its members of the mutual family togetherness and inspiration that the Chorus always aspires to attain. It was the processional music at the opening of BGMC's first public concert ("Music From the Heart") on February 9, 2002. The men of



the Chorus, singing this music with feeling and intensity, strode down the aisles of the Unitarian Universalist Church in Buffalo, with uninvited (but welcome) television news cameras recording the event.

The audience that night was huge -- the Church was filled, chairs lined the aisles and, sadly, people had to be turned away at the door. All concerts after that were offered twice in each performance weekend until, some years later, the Chorus began presenting three times in the weekend and, for a short time, three weekend presentations each year rather than just two. Audiences continue to be large, diverse and enthusiastic.

The Chorus has commissioned a number of compositions and special arrangements of music for its concerts. Two of them were especially commissioned for performance by the Chorus at the quadrennial Festival of GLBT choruses from all around the United States, Canada and elsewhere. The Chorus commissioned "Adamic Songs," a six-part composition featuring poems by Walt Whitman, the creation of Buffalo's Roland E. Martin. Also a BGMC commission, "Yes!" was composed by the renowned Adolphus Hailstork. "Yes!", was based on a poem by Countee Cullen, the Harlem Renaissance poet, dealing with the struggle for racial harmony. The Chorus performed these new works respectively at the GALA Festivals of over 150 GLBT Choruses in Montreal in 2004 and Miami in 2008.

The Chorus has also enjoyed remarkable creative support from other Buffalo composers and arrangers. Madeline Davis, longtime leader of the GLBT movement in Buffalo and founder of the GLBT Archives, has provided the Chorus with many poignant tunes and texts. Along with many of the GALA composers, Buffalo's Phil Sims, musician extraordinaire, has composed many beautiful arrangements for the Chorus. Marty Wimmer, a very capable and creative spirit with his moving words and music, continues as a faithful contributor to the BGMC repertoire. Marty provides two of the musical presentations offered at this weekend's concerts.

Along with its efforts and growing musical success, BGMC has received honors in many forms and venues. A number of awards from Artvoice's "Best in Buffalo" proclaim the Chorus the best local choral group. The Chorus was asked to sing on the Kleinhans Music Hall stage with the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra on two occasions, once for a subscription concert in 2004 and another as a benefit for the Orchestra and the Olmsted Conservancy in 2006, with Maestra JoAnn Falletta conducting. Mary Louise Nanna, founder and conductor of Ars Nova, asked the Chorus to sing in her Viva Vivaldi Series. BGMC was recognized by the Empire

State Pride Agenda in 2005 with the ESPA Award for Community Service awarded to the Chorus for the excellence of its music and its dedication to the community. In March 2008, BGMC was chosen to receive the prestigious Buffalo and Erie County Arts Council Award for exceptional contributions to the arts and cultural community in Western New York.

BGMC's success has brought many requests from worthy organizations to perform benefit concerts, and the Chorus attempts to honor these requests when it is able to do so. The Chorus has received grants and gifts and much support from both the GLBT community and the community at large. It is pleased to be able to reciprocate.

A major force in the BGMC success has been the impressive dedication, hard work and unflagging efforts by the Chorus singers, as well as the dedication of its non-singing members and volunteers. The Chorus understands the need to create a positive social impact in the affected communities as effectively and meaningfully as possible. It finds itself in a relatively conservative environment, a factor that, if anything, should make its efforts and impact all the more important, and, it continues to hope, all the more effective. In addition to its influence on the community at large, it is clear that the Chorus has helped raise the self esteem of an historically marginalized portion of our society. Its high profile has helped to create a positive model for those who are grappling with the negativity that is too often imposed on GLBT people.

Buffalo Gay Men's Chorus takes great pride in what it has been able to accomplish in the first nine years of its existence. Probably the greatest accomplishment has been its success in weaving the different lives and personalities of its members and of the communities it serves through the tug and magic of music, sung from the heart. The Chorus is, truly, a family. We are delighted to have all of you join us as you listen to our songs.

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## About the Artistic Director



Barbara Wagner, Artistic Director of the Buffalo Gay Men's Chorus, has served as Minister of Music at the Unitarian Universalist Church of Buffalo for 48 years and was Director of Vocal Activities at Nichols School for more than 24 years.

The Choir at the UU Church, in addition to its Sunday morning responsibilities, enjoyed two highly acclaimed European tours: the first to Germany, Austria and the

Czech Republic, and the second to Ireland, Wales, England and Scotland. The Choir, under Ms. Wagner's direction, has recorded for American Public Radio, performed locally with the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra (BPO), Amherst Saxophone Quartet and the Ars Nova Musicians. Ms. Wagner was the conductor for the Peace Odyssey Concert Tour of Hungary and the former Soviet Union. Choral singers from all over the US participated in this tour.

She ran a choral program at Nichols High School that involved more than 100 young singers, including a Concert Chorus, Women's Ensemble, Men's Ensemble and a Mixed Chamber Group. She was also guest conductor for the City of Good Neighbors Chorale, Buffalo's Gay and Lesbian chorus in the mid 1980s.

Ms. Wagner earned a BFA Degree from the State University of New York at Buffalo, where she studied organ with Squire Haskin, and completed graduate work at Westminster Choir College. Her advanced studies include organ with Karl Richter at the Munich Conservatory and conducting with Raymond Harvey, formerly Assistant Conductor of the BPO and presently Music Director of the Kalamazoo Symphony.

She is a member of the American Choral Director's Association, the Erie County Music Educators Association, MENC; Unitarian Universalist Musicians Network (founding member, former vice president and board member); NYSSMA; the American Guild of Organists (former sub-dean and program chair for the Buffalo Chapter); and the Chromatic Club of Buffalo. She was a member of the Hymnbook Commission for Singing the Living Tradition and served as chair of the New Hymns Task Force of the Unitarian Universalist Association. She is presently the Moderator of the 900 member Unitarian Universalist Musicians' Network.

Ms. Wagner was the recipient of the Buffalo Philharmonic/Erie County Music Educators Award for Excellence in Choral Music in 2002, and has been included several times in *Who's Who in American Women* and *Who's Who in America.* 



About the Accompanist



A native of North Carolina, Debi Overton (Accompanist/Conductor), has held positions as coach/ accompanist at the University of Texas at Austin and served as Director of the Chamber Music Program at The New School of Music in Philadelphia. For many years she was active at the Summer Music Festival in Aspen, Colorado. As the coach/accompanist for the Choral Department in Aspen, she served as assistant to noted conductor Fiora Contino. She has assisted

in preparing choruses and soloists for such conductors as Tamara Brooks, John Nelson, Robert Shaw and Sergei Commissiona. Additionally, she has coached with coach/accompanists David Garvey, John Wustman, Brooks Smith, Dalton Baldwin and the local master, Livingston Gearhart.

Ms. Overton has accompanied Master Classes for Luciano Pavarotti, Phyllis Curtin, Jessye Norman, Leontyne Price and Sylvia McNair. She has accompanied the regional Metropolitan Opera auditions in Greensboro, NC; Philadelphia, PA; Atlanta, GA; and New York City.

In addition to her duties as Organist and Choir Master at Calvary Episcopal Church in Williamsville, NY, Ms. Overton has enjoyed the position of accompanist for the Buffalo Gay Men's Chorus since its inception in 2001; is a past chair of the Music Commission of the WNY Episcopal Diocese; currently serves as a member of the Board of Directors for the American Guild of Organists; and is active in Western New York teaching, guest conducting, accompanying and performing with singers and instrumentalists. In November of 2007, Debi was the musical director and conductor for the WNY premiere performance of Leonard Bernstein's MASS. Most recently, Debi was pleased to have served as guest conductor for the Freudig Singer's 2010 winter and spring concerts.



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
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
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
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
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
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
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




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
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
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
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


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
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
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
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
