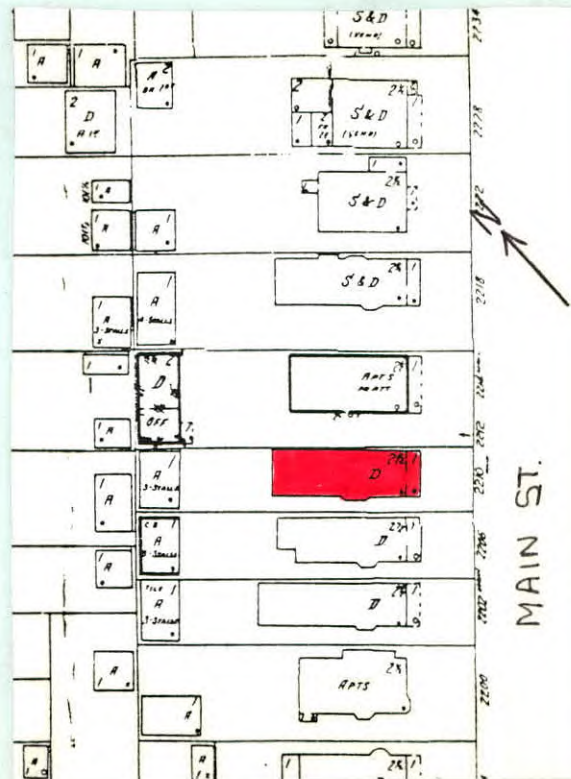

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located three blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):

Two and a half story with front facing gable roof. Full-width flat roof enclosed porch. Extending eaves with modillions. Glass paneled door with lighted border. Sidelights. Tapered Doric pilasters, with capital elaboration, flank window bays. Three single light windows with transom. Second floor has semi-hexagonal bay, double hung windows, l/l lights. Glass paneled porch door. Pedimented

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A typical gable frame residence found throughout Buffalo with a minimum application of Craftsman styling. Originally the Buffalo and Williamsville Macadam Road, Main Street was a pre-existing street at the time Olmsted designated it as the eastern border for "The Parkside." While the streets within the subdivision were designed specifically to avoid commercial development, this portion of Main Street became a combination of commercial and residential structures. It was also a major thoroughfare into the city, allowing easy access to downtown from this suburban neighborhood.
