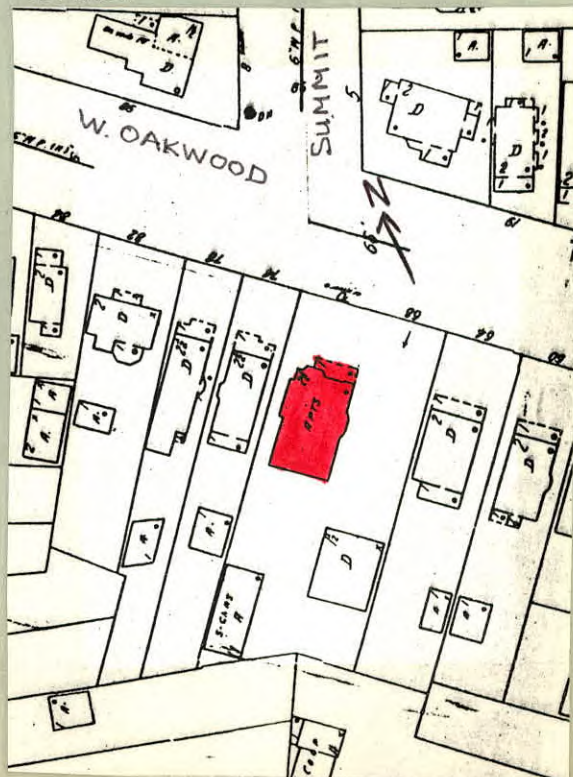

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located three blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):
 Two and a half story Queen Anne style. Cross gable roof. Full-width flat roof porch has slender paired square supports. Stick balustrade with center 'X' pattern. Upper porch balustrade imitates lower balustrade. Right semi-hexagonal bay on first floor. Center glass and wood paneled door. Double-hung 1/1 windows on side of bay. Boxed center bay has glass and wood paneled door.

19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: c. 1890

ARCHITECT: _____ Left bay has double-sash light door. Second floor semi-hexagonal bay. Double-hung 1/1 windows. Left BUILDER: bay has double-sash lighted doors. Pedimented gable has recessed porch with balcony. Glass and wood paneled

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: door flanked by 6/1 windows.
 A vernacular verions of the Queen Anne style. West Oakwood Place extends from Main Street to Parkside Avenue. At the northern border of the first section of the subdivision to be developed, the eastern portion of West Oakwood was deeded to the city by Jacob Davis in 1887 and the remainder by Caroline Jewett in 1888. West Oakwood closely resembles a street found in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." While it does not connect with Jewett Avenue at the park entrance as Olmsted originally planned, it remains curvilinear and as a cross street provides easy access to the main thoroughfares and the park.
