We recently helped plant trees when we sang at Kleinhans Music Hall on November 19 at a benefit concert for the Olmsted Parks Conservancy. Additionally, we helped our community to continue to hear the beautiful music of the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra as part of the funds aided that group as well.

The BGMC was part of Buffalo's welcoming committee when we were invited to perform in honor of the visit of the Amistad Freedom Schooner at the Erie Basin Marina. We have performed in Niagara Falls to help with Community Missions and Mark's House in that community. We have assisted the University of Buffalo Dental School CARES program to provide services to those in need. Moreover, we have helped organizations

This extraordinary time of "Celebration" has brought with it countless poignant BGMC memories from the past 5+ years. I remember the interviews with the board when they were considering me for the position of artistic director. The openness and understanding on both sides was a blessing. When I asked why in the world they would want to hire a "straight old broad" like me, there was uproarious laughter. I think the miracle began for me when I truly understood why two men singing "We Kiss in a Shadow" would be unbelievably touching.

Our first concert was on February 9, 2002, as we sang to a standing room only crowd in the sanctuary of the Unitarian Universalist Church where we had rehearsed all fall and winter. Following are a few of the words I spoke to the audience that cold winter night and they still hold true, perhaps even more so than they did then.

"As most of you know, we came together for our very first rehearsal on the evening of September 11, 2001. We were stunned with shock and grief at the horror of the day's events. We touched one another, we held each other, we cried, we sang, we even laughed a little and I saw and felt the miracle of this chorus begin to unfold. We needed each other that night. (We still do.) The talent, the courage, the unbridled joyousness, the generosity and the love that is the Buffalo Gay Men's Chorus has spilled over into my life like nothing else ever could. These men have stolen my heart and I know that we cannot ever keep from singing."

And so we celebrate with music on January 19 at the Unitarian Universalist Church and again on January 20 at Westminster Presbyterian Church. I love to program our concerts and this one has been no exception. We wanted to give our singers an opportunity to choose some of their all time favorite songs from the past five years, but also continue our tradition of offering you some of the greatest works from the male choral repertoire.

The first half of the program represents in song many of the values we can all honor. It's really a brand new "mini" BGMC concert filled with songs that celebrate brotherhood/sisterhood,

music, faith, with a powerful chant from the Russian Orthodox tradition. We celebrate love and creativity in a new piece entitled "To a Stranger" composed by our friend Marty Wimmer. Wait until you hear a gorgeous setting of "Shenandoah" and finally "You Can't Stop the Beat" from "Hairspray." The choreography is great fun!

After intermission, the trip down memory lane begins, as we sing at least one favorite from each concert, beginning with the very first concert in February 2002. These are all chorus favorites and I suspect audience favorites, too—"Non Nobis Domine," "Rhythm of Life," "Nessun Dorma," "Dirait-on," "Seasons of Love," "Our Love is Soaring Across the Land" and much more.

We celebrate ALL who have chosen to travel and continue to travel this glorious journey with us as we spread the good news of the Buffalo Gay Men's Chorus and the tolerance, understanding, acceptance, and love it represents.

In the spotlight: Mike Styn Music in the heart

Mike Styn, tenor II, has spent his life with music and the BGMC now reaps the rewards of such tremendous experience. Currently, Mike_oversees the production of our CDs. Those who have one or more of them can appreciate the expertise that is needed to bring each one of them home to you.

Mike was recorded at age two singing "Cruising Down the River," thus beginning his passion for collecting records for his new phonograph and setting the stage for his life

work. Years of private organ lessons afforded him the confidence to play hymns in church. As a schoolboy, Mike sang in several groups at St. Leo's Elementary, St. Anne's Church, and with the Buffalo Choral Arts Society. As a youth he joined the Teen DJ program at WYSL and subsequently had shows on WNIA, WBLK, and WBEN-FM.


As Mike tells it, "I developed my recording skills when my friend Ben Freedman and I built a studio in his attic. We hired four singers and produced jingles and commercials for radio stations. There, I became proficient at mixing, processing, and overdubbing their voices to produce a rich, full sound."

Mike was hired to do a show on WECK. In time, he became the music director. Later, he developed and maintained music programming at stations in Cincinnati and Oklahoma City. His programming included: popular standards, soft rock, classic rock, and oldies formats. Additionally, he coproduced singing jingles for most of those stations.

In 1998, a desire to resume choral singing led Mike to join St. John's-Grace Episcopal Church choir where his fine tenor voice still can be heard each week. When he read the Gaywatch ad in the spring of 2001, he joyfully leapt at the opportunity to sing in a gay chorus. Thus, Mike joined the BGMC and has appeared in all ten of our concerts.

The skills, the commitment, and the heart that Mike brings to the Buffalo Gay Men's Chorus makes him a very important commodity—a good friend, a competent craftsman, and a dedicated member of a very important part of the Western New York arts community. We salute Mike for all his gifts to us.






Barbara shows us how to breathe.

Violins and voices by Lawrence Van Heusen, bass II

Most of us go to an orchestral concert and end up seeing the backside of the conductor for the duration. Fortunately, there is plenty else of visual interest: the sweeping motions of the strings, the brassy glare of the trumpets, and the mastered coordination of the percussionist who can do more instrument changes in an evening than Vicky Vogue does costume changes in a month. And then there's the music.

On November 19 the Buffalo Gay Men's Chorus experienced the face of JoAnn Falletta as she conducted us and the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra. Each musical phrase transmitted through her gentle smiles, graceful arms, and omnipresent eyes the sheer emotional meaning of the music. It was something that only we, on stage at Kleinhans Music Hall, could see. It was as though we had centered on her face, been hypnotized into our cues and our crescendos, leaving the printed pages of our music behind to soar with her through the vaulted space.

Nowhere was this more evident than in our encore piece, "Nessun Dorma." My partner, Bob Scharf, who was in the audience, said to me later, "Now, that's the way its supposed to be performed with an orchestra and full brass, just like in the opera house." Since we won't be singing at La Scala anytime soon, this may be closest we come to Puccini's intentions.

Singing with the orchestra was a delight in other ways as well. At the end of Randall Thompson's "Stopping By Woods," the final drone of the orchestral bass matched the fearful beauty of the deep woods. "Ching-A-Ring Chaw" really came fully alive for the first time for me when the racing orchestra set the pace and Aaron Copland's orchestration was fully realized. In a departure from normal maestro protocol, Ms. Falletta stepped aside to let our own Barbara Wagner conduct us, two violins and piano in Edward Elgar's lush and romantic "The Snow."

To Michael Gillis this concert must have seemed like the planets had aligned with the sun. In an amazing tour de force, the board of the Olmstead Parks Conservancy on which he serves had deftly collaborated and engaged the diverse resources needed to make this event possible. That afternoon, the chorus, the orchestra, and solo violinist Phillipe Quint, playing on an authentic Stradivarius, brought the audience to its feet and sent us those telltale goose bumps and tears of joy which signal ambient beauty. The proceeds of the concert and the art auction which followed totaled over \$40,000. These funds will be used to support the BPO and restore the park's ravaged trees and do as much as humankind can to preserve the source of all beauty: nature herself.


