Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located one block from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):
Two and a half story frame with front-facing gable roof. Full-width flat roof porch. Rough cut, regular course stone base. Square doric supports. Stick balustrade. Entablature with extending cornice. Left bay first floor has glass and wood paneled door flanked on one side by 3/4 length sidelight. First floor single hung window with leaded top light. Window and door

19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1908 floor semi-hexagonal bay.

ARCHITECT: Glass and wood paneled door in center with double hung 1/1 windows flanking. Left bay has double hung 1/1

BUILDER: window. Entablature window and door surround.
Pedimented gable, shingled, has paired 6/1 windows.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: Entablature window surround.
A simplified version of a frame Slender end doric pilaster gabled Colonial Revival style, strips.
typical of residences found throughout Buffalo. Florence Avenue extends from Main Street to Parkside Avenue, paralleling Robie Street. Located within the first section of the Parkside subdivision to be developed, Florence Avenue was deeded to the city by Jacob Davis in 1887. Although Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside" show a street angling from the intersection of Main and Humboldt to Parkside Avenue, when it was finally developed Florence Avenue was modified to parallel Humboldt Avenue. It nevertheless still followed Olmsted's rule that a subdivision street "not lead
