

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:
(Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)
Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's
Parkside subdivision. House is located four blocks from
Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on
the National Register, and east of the Zoo.
18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):
Two and a half story frame with front facing gable roof. Partial-
width flat roof porch. Brick base and column supports. Paneled square Doric supports. Entablature with extending cornice. Glass
paneled door flanked on one side by small rectangular leaded
window First floor window single hung with regtangular leaded
top light. Entablature window surrounds. Second floor
SIGNIFICANCE 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1905 semi-hexagonal oriel. Double
nung 1/1 windows. Entablatur
ARCHITECT: window surrounds. Left end bay second floor has glass
and wood paneled porch door flanked on one side by double hung 1/1 window. Pedimented gable has three-
part window, double hung 1/1 lights with entablature
20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: window head.
A gable frame residence with Colonial Revival style details.
Greenfield Street extends from Amherst Street to Main Street,
paralleling the Belt Line Railroad. Although Greenfield Street was deeded to the city in 1889, it was laid out in 1886 by the
Parkside Land Company, which had purchased the land between Amherst
Street and West Oakwood Place from two major landowners, Elam R.
Jewett and Washington Russell. A street very similar in configurati
appears in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." Greenfiel
follows Olmsted's plan for providing easy access to major streets while being too narrow for extensive commercial development,
although some commercial buildings can be found near Main Street.
