

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

(Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located three blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story Colonial Revival style. Front-facing gable roof. Full-width flat-roof porch with right side projection. Rough cut, regular course stone base and pedestals. Large semicircular arch in porch base. Fluted Ionic columns. Spindle balustrade. Boxed entrance bay. Glass paneled door. First floor tri-part window; single hung with leaded top SIGNIFICANCE Second floor lights. 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1908

left bay has single hung ARCHITECT: window with leaded top light. Bowed left bay has center single-hung window with leaded top light and double hung leaded sides. Pedimented gable has BUILDER: Palladian window. Hip roof dormer on building's side.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: Three double hung 1/1 windows. Colonial Revival styled gabled residence with Classical details. Similar to 78 West Oakwood in building plan. West Oakwood Place extends from Main Street to Parkside Avenue. At the northern border of the first section of the subdivision to be developed, the eastern portion of West Oakwood was deeded to the city by Jacob Davis in 1887 and the remainder by Caroline Jewett in 1888. West Oakwood closely resembles a street found in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." While it does not connect with Jewett Avenue at the park entrance as Olmsted originally planned, it remains curvilinear and as a cross street provides easy access to the main thoroughfares and the park.
