

Gabled porch, enclosed, has band of 15-light windows. Six-light door. Decorative half-timbering in gable. Bargeboard with square motif decorating. Brick first floor. Second story overhand with exposed brackets. Decorative half-timbering in upper floors. Second floor has centered three-part 9/1 window flanked on

Through the cornice gabled dormers on north and BUILDER: south side of structure.					
20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A typical adaptation of Tudor style. Summit Avenue is a truncated north-south street, located between Woodward and Crescent Avenues and extending from West Oakwood Place to the northern section of Crescent Avenue. A similar street, ending south of Jewett Avenue, appears in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." Summit Avenue was deeded to the city in 1889, except for the small section between Amherst and Crescent which was deeded in 1892. This street follows Olmsted's rule that it "not lead with special directness toward the town."
