

	Albrigt-Knox Art Gallery's Henry-Russel Hitchcock's Architectural Exhibition,
	1940, Hitchcock wrote; "The finest Wright house in Buffalo is of wood rather
	than of masonry and has therefore a lightness nad articulatin which the others
	lack. The cross shaped plan is here more boldly developed so that all the chief rooms have three exposures while the two story living room has the height so
	frequently lacking in Wright's interiors."
	The house was designed by Wright for a Larking Co. executive, Walter Davidson,
	who joined the company in 1906 and left both the comapny and the house in
	1913 in order to establish the Davidson Shoe Comapny. The stuccoed wood construction and colorless glass are indicitive of a relatively modest budget. City

permits, Buffalo, NY listes the cost of the home at \$6,000. The unobtrusive exterior of the house gives little indication of a two-story cathedral-like living room illuminated by a huge bay window at the east end of the room and by the clerestory windows along the north and south walls. West of the living room the house divides into two stories, which are in turn divided into multiple floor levels. Spatial grandeur is cleverly played off the intimacy, while even the smallest of spaces is opened up through Wright's use of banded window sequences.

Additional rooms were added to the garage in the 1930's in a manner that closely follows the style of the original house except for the arched passageway that leads through to the back yard.
