

	area of curved winding streets on the north and east sides of
	the park. This section of Amherst St. was actually created by the City of Buffalo in 1875 when Amherst St. was extended from Delaware
	Ave. to Main St The street follows Olmsted's original plan maintain-
	ing the picturesque character that he envisioned for the streets sur-
