

Crescent enue is the longest curvilinear street in the Parkside odivision, stretching from Humboldt Avenue to Colvin Street. is street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The rkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent Avenue had been dified by Olmsted to its current form. Portions of the street re deeded to the city by five different owners over a span of ve years, beginning in 1887 near Humboldt and ending in 1892 ar Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins and ends within the Parkside odivision, following Olmsted's rule that a suburban neighborhood reet "not lead with special directness toward the town."
