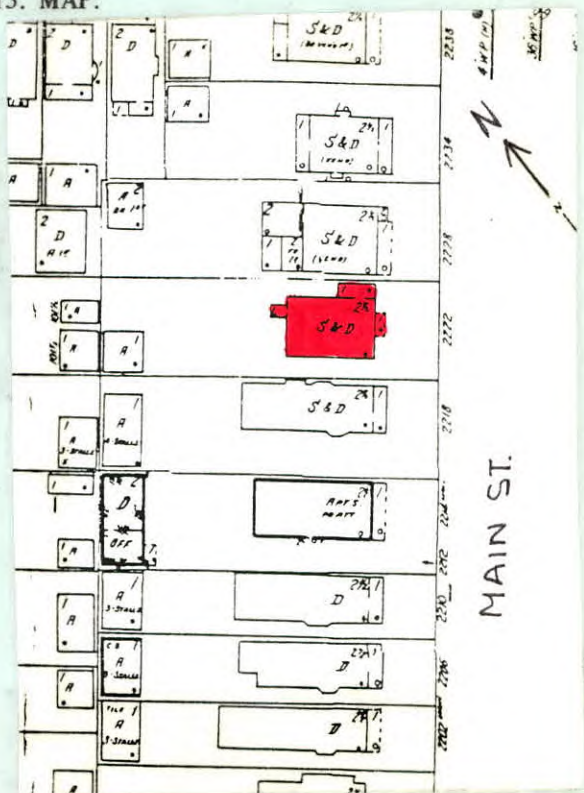

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located three blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):

Two and a half story Colonial Revival style. Hip roof with curved brackets and dentils under eave. Centrally located entrance. Four light wood paneled door with paneled sidelights. Flat-roof entrance porch with slender square supports. North end bay has double-hung straight-headed, 1/1 light window. South end bay has semi-hexagonal bay. 1/1 light windows. Second floor semi-hexagonal oriel, double-hung 1/1

SIGNIFICANCE

19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: c. 1908
 ARCHITECT: _____ windows. End Doric pilaster strips. Hip roof dormer has three 1/1 windows. Paneled pilaster strips flank.
 BUILDER: One story wing on north side, flat roof. Double hung 1/1 window. Entablature with dentils under cornice

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: spans wing.

A typical Colonial Revival style influenced by American Four Square form. Originally the Buffalo and Williamsville Macadam Road, Main Street was a pre-existing street at the time Olmsted designated it as the eastern border for "The Parkside." While the streets within the subdivision were designed specifically to avoid commercial development, this portion of Main Street became a combination of commercial and residential structures. It was also a major thoroughfare into the city, allowing easy access to downtown from this suburban neighborhood.
