House is directly opposite Delaware Park which was designed by F.L.O. and is listed on the National Register. A dense grove of trees and the Buffalo Zoo are across the street from this property.

Shed dormer towards rear of east side. Pavillion on east side of house has a gable roof. Four six light over single pane windows on second floor front facade. Enclosed porch on front of house. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: This section of Amherst Street, between Colvin and Parkside, was conceived by F.L.O. around 1873 as part of a residential "suburb" adjacent to Delaware Park. This suburb was called "The Parkside" by Olmsted and appears on an 1876 map drawn by him as a proposed area of curved winding streets on the north and east sides of the park. This section of Amherst Street was actually created by the City of Buffalo in 1875 when Amherst Street was extended from Delaware Avenue to Main Street. The street follows Olmsted's original plan maintaining the picturesque character that he envisioned for the streets surrounding the park.
