

	Par Del	ilding is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's rkside subdivision. House is located two blocks from laware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on Rational Register, and southeast of the Zoo.	
18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story with Prairie School and Craftsman styling. Side gable roof with exposed rafter tails and curvilinear brackets with pendants under eave. Clapboard first floor. Gabled partial width wing has bargeboard and exposed rafter tails. Paired 8/8 windows. End pilasters. Wing supported by masonry piers. SIGNIFICANCE First floor 1/1 windows. Band course at second floor level. Shingled second floor. 4/1 second floor			
		ARCHITECT: windows. Gabled dormer has exposed rafter tails, bargeboard with curved ends and curvilinear brackets BUILDER: with pendants. Paired rectangular single light windows.	
20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A vernacular version of the Prairie School residence with elaborate Craftsman styling applied. Summit Avenue is a truncated north-south street, located between Woodward and Crescent Avenues and extending from West Oakwood Place to the northern section of Crescent Avenue. A similar street, ending south of Jewett Avenue, appears in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." Summit Avenue was deeded to the city in 1889, except for the small section between Amherst and Crescent which was deeded in 1892. This street follows Olmsted's rule that it "not lead with special directness toward the town."
