

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

(Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)

Building is situated on a standard sized corner lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located two blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story Colonial Revival styled double residence. Steep pitch side gable roof. Two story flat roof porch. First and second floor Doric columns support entablature. First floor left bay has glass and wood paneled door. Two double-hung 1/1 windows. Plain surround. Left bay second floor has double-hung 1/1 window flanked by glass and wood paneled porch 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: c. 1902 Over-scale pedimented gable

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: Good example of a simplified Colonial Revival style applied to a double residence. West Oakwood Place extends from Main Street to Parkside Avenue. At the northern border of the first section of the subdivision to be developed, the eastern portion of West Oakwood was deeded to the city by Jacob Davis in 1887 and the remainder by Caroline Jewett in 1888. West Oakwood closely resembles a street found in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." While it does not connect with Jewett Avenue at the park entrance as Olmsted originally planned, it remains curvilinear and as a cross street provides easy access to the main thoroughfares and the park.
