

Two dormers with hip roofs and two six light over single pane windows on front of house. Front porch has a gable roof and four doric columns. Doorway has a broken pediment and recessed frame panels on either side of door. Two six light over single pane windows over front porch. 20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: This section of Amherst Street, between Colvin and Parkside, was conceived by F.L.O. around 1873 as part of a residential "suburb" adjacent to Delaware Park. This suburb was called "The Parkside" by Olmsted and appears on an 1876 map drawn by him as a proposed area of curved winding streets on the north and east sides of the park. This section of Amherst Street was actually created by the City of Buffalo in 1875 when Amherst Street was extended from Delaware Avenue to Main Street. The street follows Olmsted's original plan maintaining the picturesque character that he envisioned for the streets surrounding the park.
