

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)

Building is situated on a standard sized corner lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located two blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story double house. Hip roof. Center recessed entrance has fluted pilasters supporting broken pediment. Curvilinear opening at top. Pair of wood paneled doors. First floor windows, multi-light with paneled apron decorated with button motif. Second floor center has a pair of windows. Prismshaped tracery in top light. 1/1 light windows flank. 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: c. 1904 Hip roof dormer with three

square single light windows.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: One of three double houses erected in this section of Crescent, making use of Colonial Revival details. Crescent Avenue is the longest curvilinear street in the Parkside subdivision, stretching from Humboldt Avenue to Colvin Street. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent Avenue had been modified by Olmsted to its current form. Portions of the street were deeded to the city by five different owners over a span of five years, beginning in 1887 near Humboldt and ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins and ends within the Parkside subdivision, following Olmsted's rule that a suburban neighborhood street "not lead with special directness toward the 21.
