

	Co. St. sec of the res	HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A simplified form of the lonial Revival style. West Oakwood Place extends from Main reet to Parkside Avenue. At the northern border of the first ction of the subdivision to be developed, the eastern portion West Oakwood was deeded to the city by Jacob Davis in 1887 and a remainder by Caroline Jewett in 1888. West Oakwood closely sembles a street found in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The rkside." While it does not connect with Jewett Avenue at the rk entrance as Olmsted originally planned, it remains citinear and as a cross street provides easy access to the in thoroughfares and the park.
