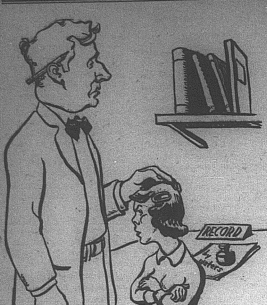
A special meeting arrangement is scheduled for the Sing.

**Dr. Benjamin F. Gronewald**

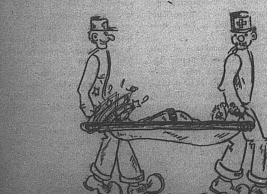

Then in more recent years, he has been Director of Extension and the summer sessions at the Milwaukee College for teachers in Wisconsin. While teaching there he was invited to join the faculty of S.T.C.

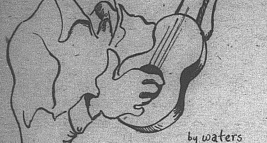

It has long been felt that an association of the Teachers College publications would be of value to the participating publications because we face very different problems. However, we will need the assistance of other teachers' colleges and universities. Last March representatives of the various state colleges met in Plattsburgh and started the ball rolling. At that time, Buffalo State was requested to act as host for a proposed fall meeting.

The purposes of the NYSTC Press Association are: 1. To raise the standards of the college publications. 2. To foster a better inter-collegiate relationship. 3. To increase student participation and responsibility in their school publications. 4. To further the exchange of news between schools.

Master's Degree Given In Teachers' Colleges

That gesture of hospitality will undoubtedly do more than any other single factor to give these representatives of other teachers' colleges a favorable impression of Buffalo State.
