

	to ext bor the Jac 188 ear wit pla	HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: The Prairie style adapted frame two and a half story residence. West Oakwood Place cends from Main Street to Parkside Avenue. At the northern of the first section of the subdivision to be developed, e eastern portion of West Oakwood was deeded to the city by cob Davis in 1887 and the remainder by Caroline Jewett in 88. West Oakwood closely resembles a street found in Olmsted's cly 1870's maps of "The Parkside." While it does not connect the Jewett Avenue at the park entrance as Olmsted originally anned, it remains curvilinear and as a cross street provides by access to the main thoroughfares and the park.
