

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located two blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and east of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story frame with front facing gable roof. Fullwidth hip roof porch has rough cut, regular course stone base. Tapered square supports and stick balustrade. Eave overhang. Projecting boxed entrance has diamond light wood door flanked on one side by double hung 1/1 window. Three-part first floor window; double hung, with 1/1 lights. Second floor has two semi-hexagonal bays. Double hung 1/1 windows. ARCHITECT: Plain window surrounds. Pedimented gable with

eave overhang. Three-part window. Double hung BUILDER: 1/1 lights. Cornice window head.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A simple frame gabled residence found throughout Buffalo. Russell Avenue extends from Parkside Avenue to Greenfield Street. It was laid out in a map of 1886, paralleling the northern border of the lands of Washington Russell, after whom the street was named. However it was early 1889 before Russell Avenue was deeded to the city. While this particular street does not appear in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside," Olmsted felt cross streets would allow easy access to major thoroughfares and to the park, and he did include similar cross streets such as Jewett Avenue in his early plans.
