

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located three blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):

Two and a half story with Prairie School influence. Hip roof with extending eaves. Full-width flat roof projecting wing with porch. Extending eave. Three-part window; center single light with single light casement sides. Porch has rough cut, regular course stone base. Paneled tapered square support. Glass and wood paneled door. North wall to wing has 6 panel wood door. Clapboard first

19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1920 floor. Second floor has
 ARCHITECT: semi-hexagonal bay. Double hung windows with three vertical lights in top light. Lighted double sash
 BUILDER: porch door. Shingle second floor. Hip roof dormer has two windows; three vertical lights each.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A typical vernacular form of Prairie School style residence. Similar to 2258 and 2264 Main Street in building style. Originally the Buffalo and Williamsville Macadam Road, Main Street was a pre-existing street at the time Olmsted designated it as the eastern border for "The Parkside." While the streets within the subdivision were designed specifically to avoid commercial development, this portion of Main Street became a combination of commercial and residential structures. It was also a major thoroughfare into the city, allowing easy access to downtown from this suburban neighborhood.
