

The grounds of the Buffalo Zoological Society relocated one block to the south OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two story Craftsman style, Gable roof with bargeboard. Triangular knee brace at gable peak and flared bargeboard end, Partial-width gable porch with bargeboard. Flared ends. Triangular knee braces. Tapered, square paneled supports. First floor has multi-light double sash windows with pedimented window surround. Second floor tri-part window, 6/1 lights. Pedimented window head with projecting cornice. Gabled former on east side, first floor boxed bay window with shed roof on east NIFICANCE side. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1914
	BUILDER: Humason Building & Reality Corp. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A good example of Craftsman Styled residence. The street reflects Olmsted's philosophy regarding roadways within a subdivision; the street is a broad, long roadway with no intersecting thoroughfares, running east to west "with no special directness toward the town." The street takes its name from James Tillinghast, owner of the property up until July 15, 1889 when it was conveyed to George L. Thorne and Byron Angell to be subdivided for residential use. The subdivision "Meadow View Park" carried restrictive covenants in its deeds of sale. The restrictions set forth minimum house costs and minimum distances for street frontage. The homes on Tillinghast were to be of "tasteful design" and the cost was not to be less than \$3,000.
