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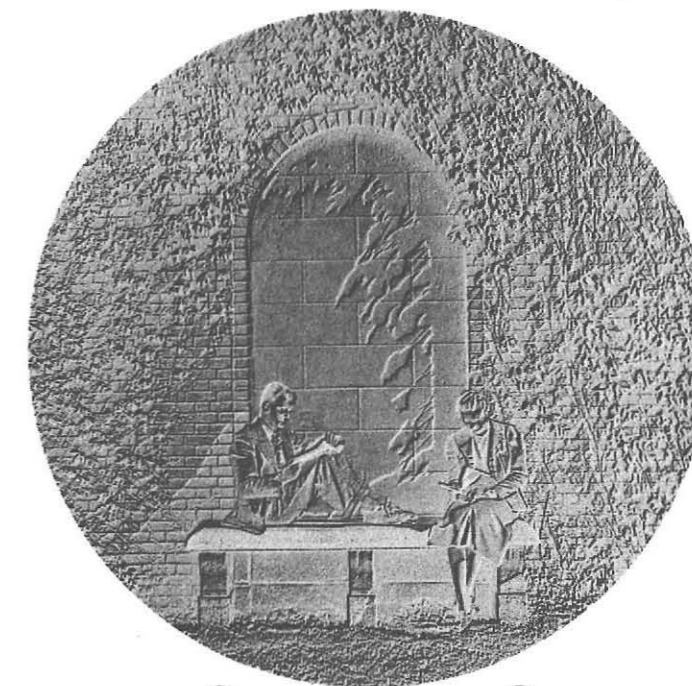

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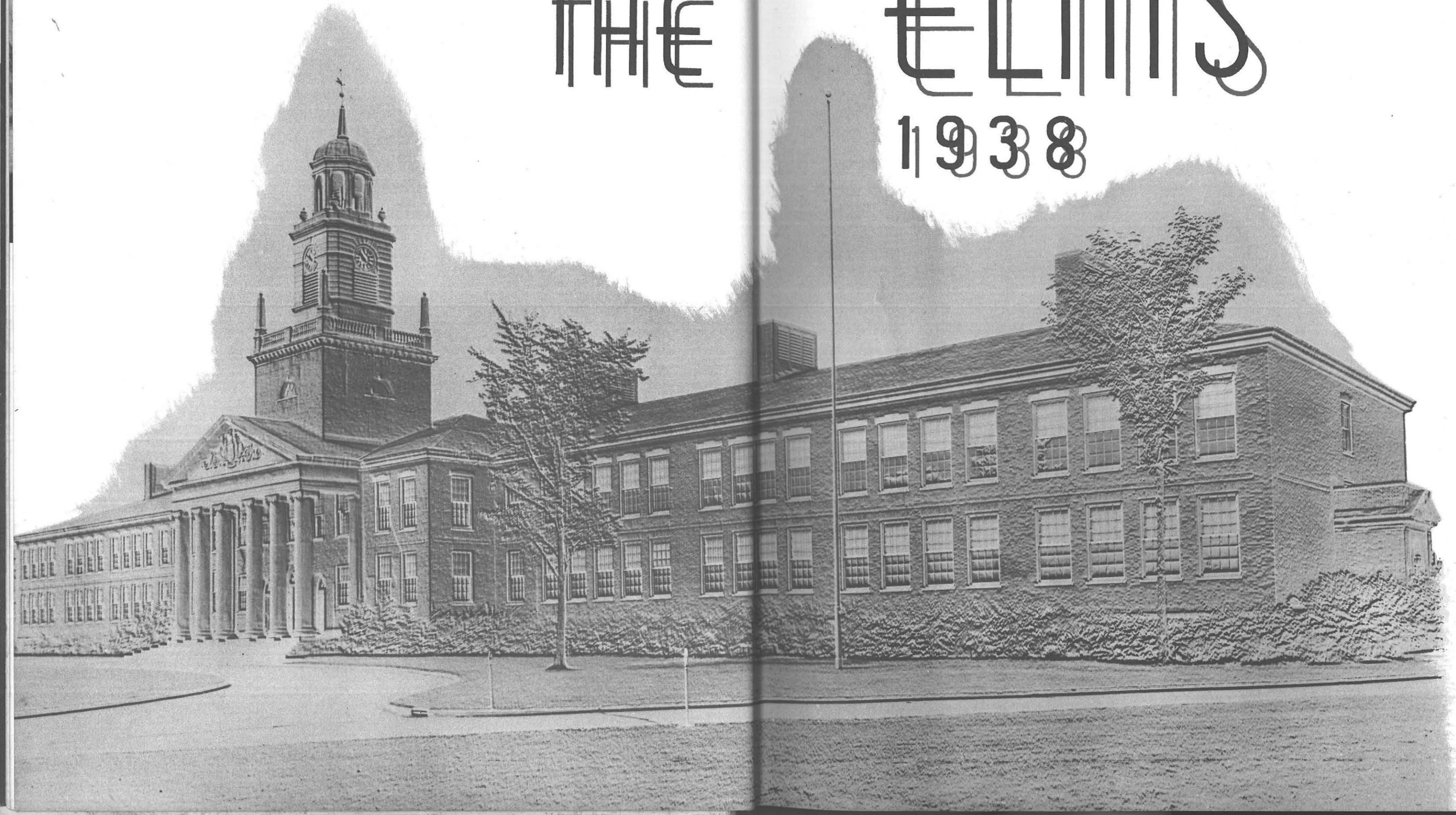

May THE ELMS be the Marker for this Milestone.*

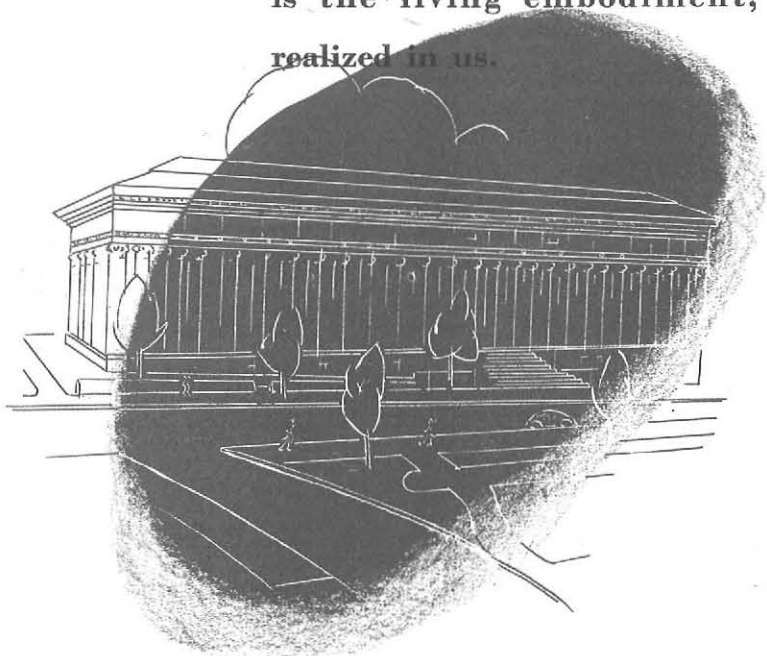

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BAS RELIEFS

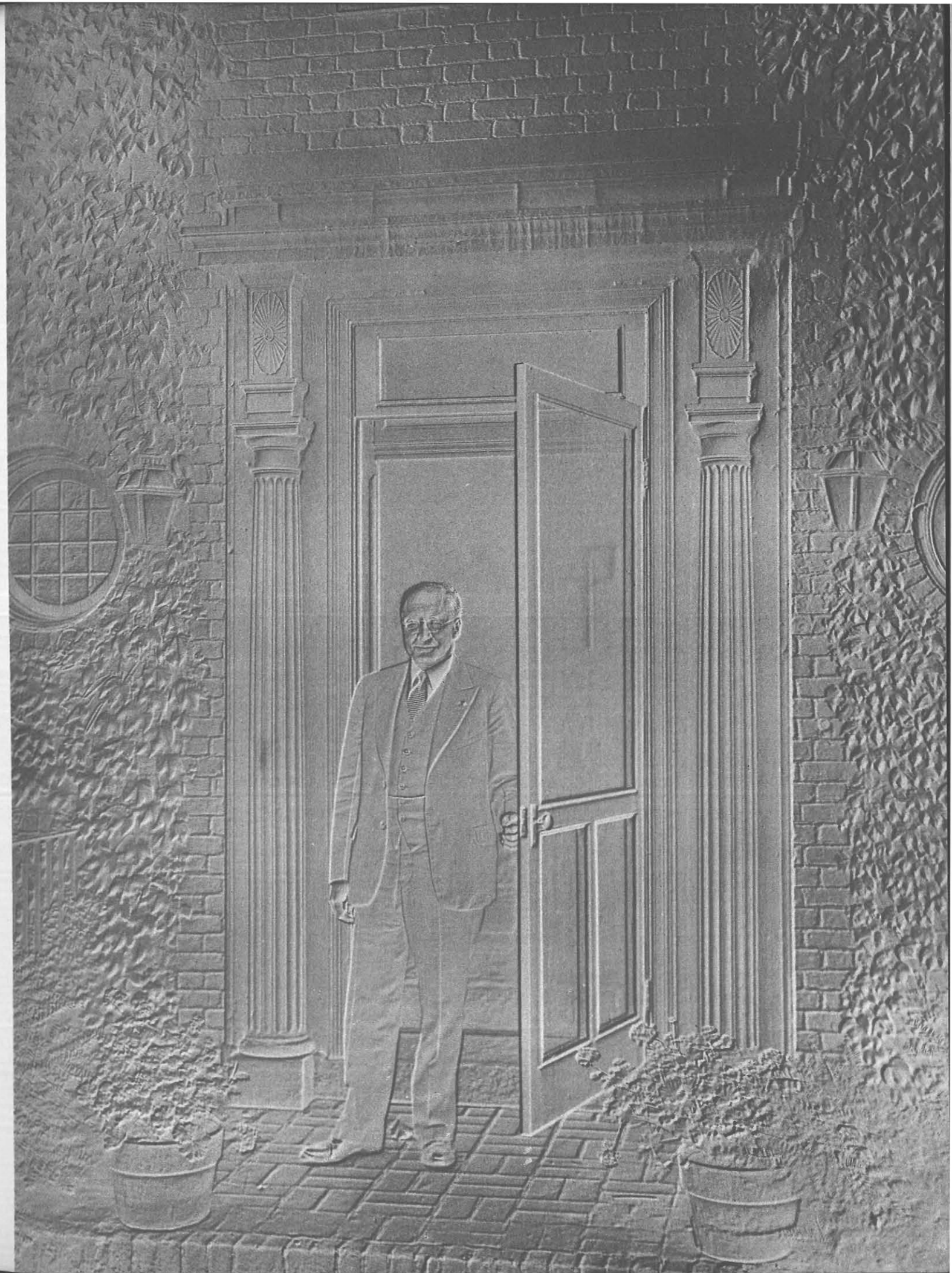

According to college authorities, the school year lasts from the fall month of September to the summer month of June, but, to those members of the college commonly designated as students, the school year's activities are bounded by two days in May, Moving-Up Day and Moving-Up Day.

On this day in May, 1937, we, the Class of 1940, cast aside our Freshman rompers and reached out for the suits of the Sophomores. Not yet for us were the caps and gowns of the stately Seniors, nor yet the workaday cover-alls of the industrious Juniors, but rather an attire more youthful than these, though lacking the adolescent touch of the Freshman play suits. Almost every organization on campus has found some Sophomore outstandingly active—Striving Sophomores, here, working for pleasure and recognition.

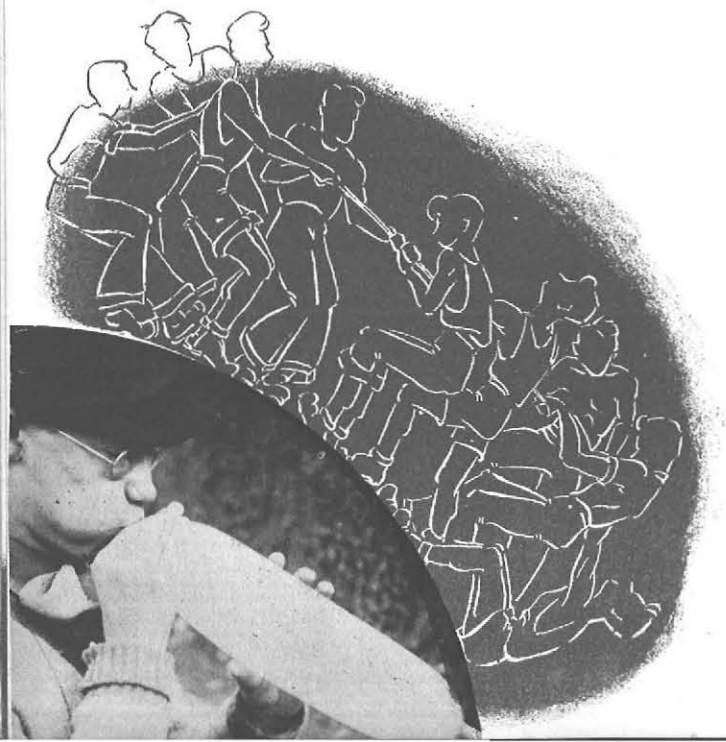
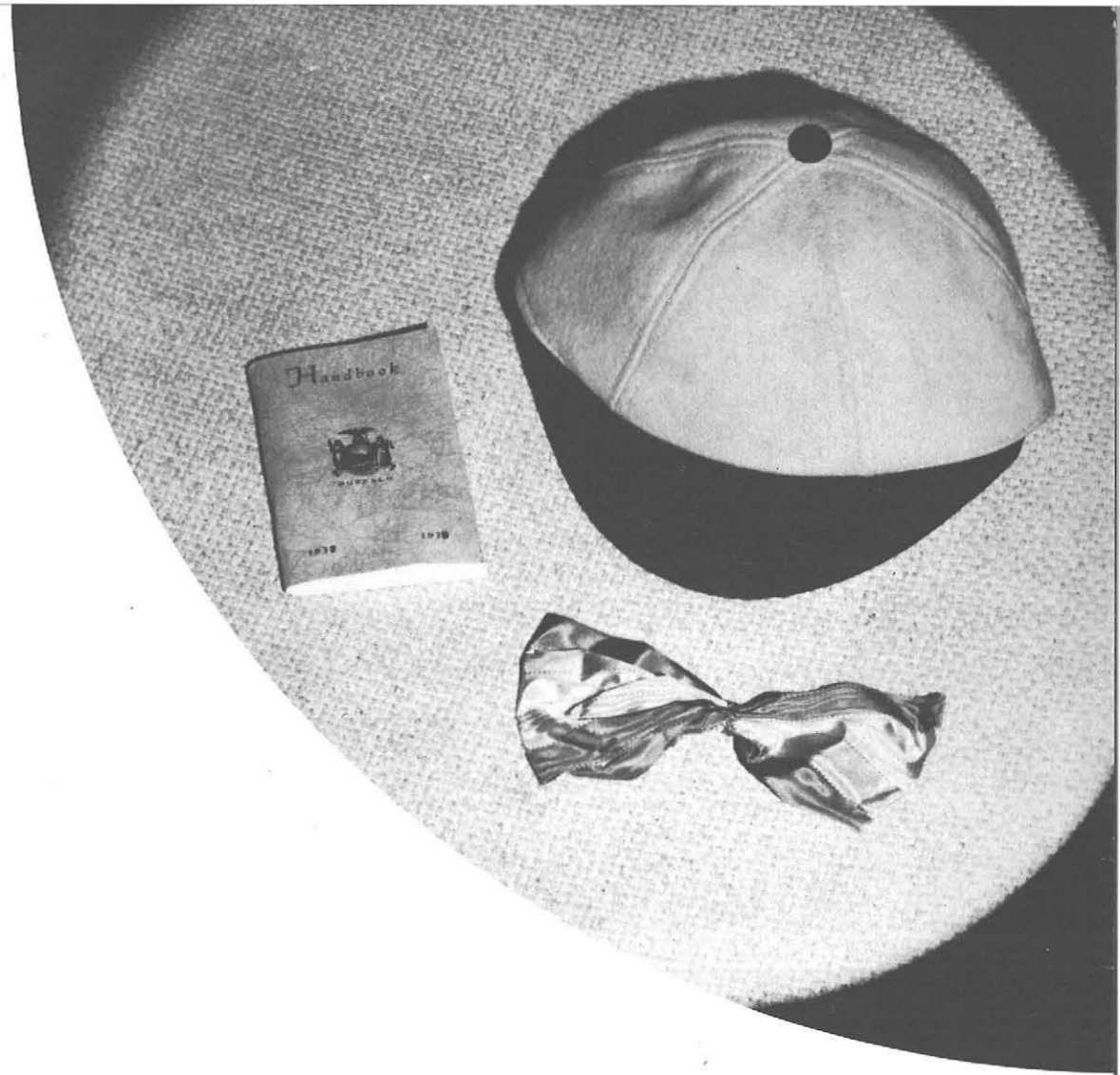

The 1938 Literary-Art Issue, edited by Annette Cinn and Mary Farrell, was published in the Spring, and it contained material truly representative of the entire college.

In the fifteenth edition there appeared an editorial, "New Head Tops All." And indeed it did, for this issue inaugurated a new and distinctive Record head, designed by Marion Whitney.

1937-1938 found The Record year a most progressive and successful one. May the coming year find The Record following the same forward movement.

Captain Bob Reist (Williams-ville)—forward, 6'1½", 155 lb. Bobby has completed four years on the Varsity, during which he played in every position. He received Honorable Mention on the All-State Teachers team in 1936 and 1938. He captained the Tennis team two years.



Stan Witmeyer (Rochester)—6'3", 170 lb. Center Stan led Buffalo district individual scoring with an average of 11.8. He was named All-State-Teachers center in 1938. He will be available for court duty until his graduation in January.



James Perona (Rochester)—guard 5'7½", 158 lb. A defensive ace, Jimmy has kept down opponent's scoring with his tenacious guarding. He has had four years of Basketball and Soccer, which team he captained in 1936-7. He was undefeated in Boxing and coached the squad three years.



Louis Rosa (Lackawanna)—guard 5'9½", 200 lb. An outstanding defensive player, Lou has held his "man" to two points or less during two years on the Varsity, while scoring twenty points against Mechanics at Rochester to average 5.9 points per game. He was given Honorable Mention on the All-State-Teachers team of 1938.



A glance at the court performances of the past year reveals that State Teachers College is enjoying competition with the other colleges of recognized standing and is holding its own.

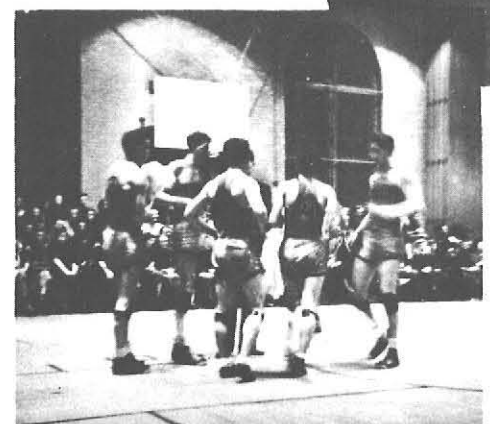
Led by Stan Witmeyer, All-State-Teachers center and Buffalo District Collegiate scoring ace, the Varsity triumphed over such foes as Grove City College, McMaster University, Fredonia Normal School, Ontario Agricultural College, Geneseo Normal School, Oswego Normal School, and Rochester Atheneum and Mechanics Institute. The latter team was defeated twice in a home-and-home series. Running their latest win streak on the home court to eleven victories, the Orange and Black see an opportunity for next year to surpass a past record of sixteen straight wins at home. This latter record broken by the loss to Niagara University on January 15, 1937. State has lost but two games at home in four years, both to Niagara.

High spots in a season replete with thrills include: Witmeyer's record score of 154 points for the season, including 32 points in a single game against Ontario Aggies.

Perona's one-handed hooker which won the Oswego game in a Frank Merriwell finish.

Highest scoring record in a single game by the team—65 points in the season opener against Geneseo, later equalled against Ontario.

Overtime tie contest with the Alumni Varsity Club, led by Dave Zwick and Paul Coleman of last year's Varsity.



Individual scoring honors went to Stan Witmeyer, lanky Rochester pivot man, whose average of 11.8 points per game also placed him in the lead of the district scoring race against men from Niagara, St. Bonaventure, Canisius, and the University of Buffalo.

Captain Bob Reist, scoring 88 points, took second place on the Varsity with a 6.2 average. Lou Rosa, Sam Munich, Paul Miller, and Jimmy Perona followed in that order.

In addition to scoring honors, Stan Witmeyer placed first team center on the All-State-Teachers Basketball team sponsored by the Record in cooperation with other teacher training institutions in the State. Lou Rosa and Bob Reist earned honorable mention positions.

Captain Reist, who leaves a record of four years of stellar activity in every position on the squad, and Jim Perona, outstanding defensive star for his four years at State, have played their last games for the Orange and Black. Stan Witmeyer, who graduates in January, will be counted on to bolster the team in first semester contests.

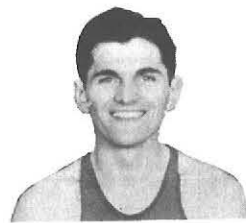

With the loss of only one varsity man from last year's team, and the addition of Freshmen swimmers to the squad, Coach Saari had a well founded aggregation at the beginning of the season. Beginning early in October, the team was in fine shape for the opening meet against McMaster University. State won handily, 47-28.

After the Christmas recess, the swimming squad traveled to Hamilton, New York to meet Colgate, where they suffered a 55-20 setback. The following meet with Toronto also ended in defeat. However, the next three encounters against Slippery Rock Teachers College, McMaster University, and Ontario Agricultural College found our men on the long end of the score. The last meet of the year against Western Reserve University saw State vanquished after a creditable showing.

Varsity Soccer

Soccer reached the peak of its career in State sports annals. During the 1937 season the Orange and Black booters slipped through their largest schedule to three victories, one tie, and only one loss.

Lacking the services of many players lost through graduation, and with Captain Crede Hagerty, former captain Jimmy Perona, and Ray Porter as the only regulars back to form the nucleus of the team, Coach Coyer whipped together a working outfit composed of letter men and new comers, in the short period of two weeks. Paul Miller, playing his first year of soccer, performed well at the goal. Dave Strebe and Ken Edmunds worked splendidly together at full back. At half back, aiding Jimmy Perona, were Lou Rosa and Howie Flierl. Joe Romano, at center forward, was flanked on the left by Crede Hagerty and Dave Missert, and on the right by Ray Porter and Jack Piatak. Of the above regular starting lineup Miller and Rosa were playing their first season of soccer. Bob Potter, the other Freshman on the team in addition to Romano, saw frequent service as general utility man on the forward line, as did also both of the Finn boys, Jack and Hal. Don Clark and Sebas Martorana shared in the action throughout the season.

In the opening game, the superiority of the Cortland Normal team and the inability of new State men to play a unified game was evident by the 3-1 score.

Against Allegheny, the State Mudders broke into the win column with a 3-1 victory as Hagerty dented the net twice and Romano once.

In making their first and only "home" appearance, Coach Coyer's men shaded the famous Colgate team 1-0 with Hagerty scoring again. Fine spirit was shown in this game both by the players and the College turnout.

Slippery Rock State Teachers College from Pennsylvania was next victim. The game resulted in the score of 2-0 with Hagerty and Missert scoring one each.

McMaster University almost upset the State apple cart in the final game by keeping a 3-1 lead up to the last five minutes, when Joe Romano broke through with two more goals, which, added to his one score in the second period, and evened the score at 3 all.

State gained further recognition in the intercollegiate circles when, for the first time, it had three players—Jimmy Perona, Ray Porter, and Crede Hagerty—mentioned as outstanding soccer men for their college during the 1936 season. B.S.T.C. is rapidly carving itself a niche in the Intercollegiate Soccer Hall of Fame.

A complete half-back line and a wing will be lost through graduation: Jimmie Perona, four years stalwart of the center half position, and captain of this year's squad; Howie Flierl, regular half-back; George Bligh, second string half-back; and Hal Finn, second string wing.

An innovation has been worked out at State in conducting cross country with Soccer. The plan has been to have the cross country runs start at the same time as the soccer games, so that the hill-and-dale-ers will be back before the soccer game is finished.

Athletic Director Coyer gave cross country a good start this last season by having the Cross country men running two meets during home games on Neumann Field. This proved to be a worthwhile venture. Whenever it can be fitted into the schedule, the cross country team will travel with the soccer squad. This he has been able to do thus far for next season with McMaster University, Slippery Rock State Teachers College, and Alleghany College.

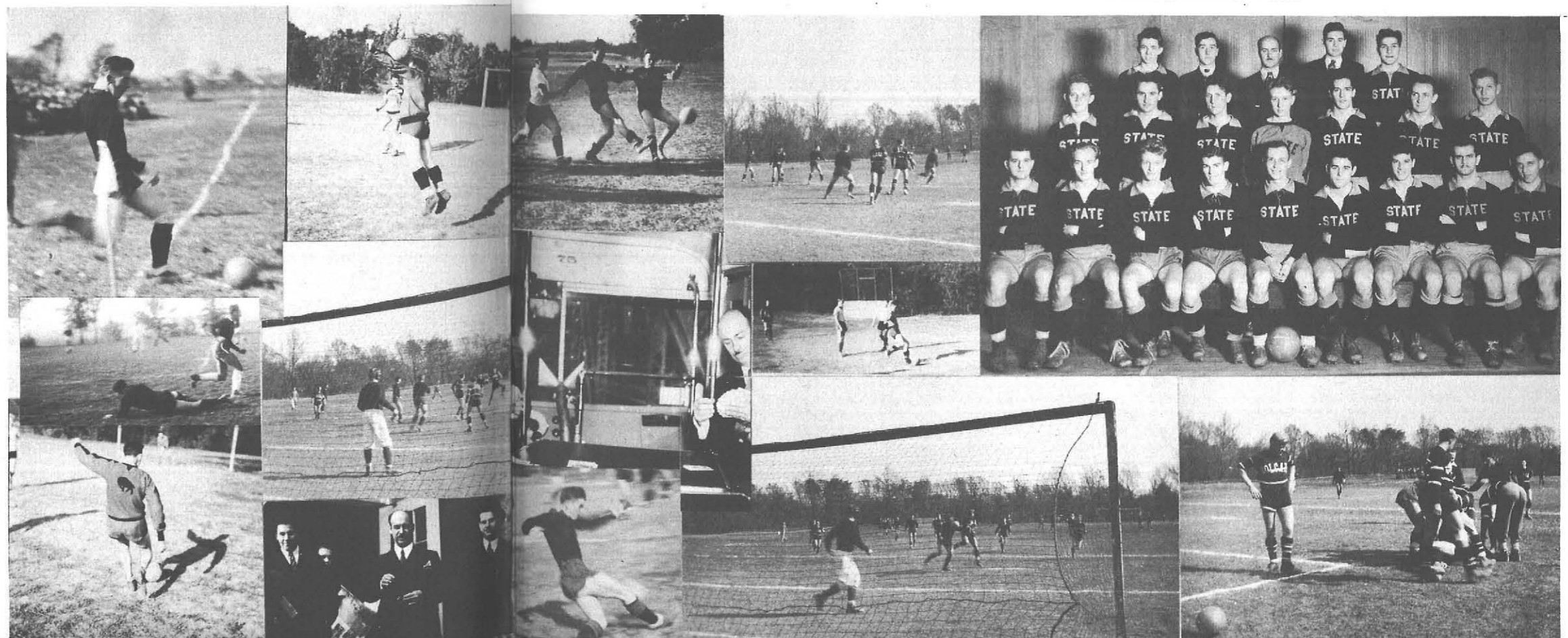

With an increase in Blanket Tax appropriations for athletics and in answer to the persistent demand of the students, the Athletic Association made the first move in expanding the sports program by putting cross country on a varsity basis. In spite of obstacles prevalent in making new ventures, this step proved to be a wise one.

Of all the candidates, there were few with previous running experience. Captain Ray Ast, who had gained laurels in inter-class runs, and Nel Voght, all-High from Bennett, formed the backbone of the team. Lanky Jack Hammel, in his first season, developed into a harrier who placed third on the Orange and Black. John Wuzek, Mat Duggan, Joe Kinzie, and John Branicki helped to bolster the scoring strength. Ed Sikorski, Bill Kackas, and Erny Zasada showed satisfactorily with the others to predict greater things in future teams.

It was practically a group of novices who, one Friday afternoon, October 15, journeyed to Fredonia to defeat the Normal School team by a 30-27 margin as Ray Ast and Nel Voght coasted into a dead beat. A week later, in a return match on a local course, Nel Voght stepped out ahead to lead the Orange and Black to a 31-26 victory.

With the experience gained in these initial runs, the team seemed destined to great heights. But in the final meet of the season, the statesmen suffered a 16-20 defeat as the hill and dalers from McMaster University ran here to place men in 1st, 3rd, 5th, and 7th positions, to the

2nd, 4th, 6th, and 8th State men, and took team prizes. Finlayson, the individual victor, outsprinted Ray Ast in the final stretch to establish a course record of 21:02.

Scoring in cross country is based on the position of the finishers. The man finishing first scores one point for his team; second scores two; third scores three, etc. Only the first five men for each team are included in the scoring. The team scoring the lowest number of aggregate points is the winner. This method was used in all of the competitions of the Locals except against McMaster when the Canadian-favored method of counting only the first four was worked.

Five miles is the official distance of the I. C. 4-A and 10,000 meters (6 1/4 miles) is the standard for the National A. A. U. championship. State competed over a 3.6 mile local course. Not so very long ago intercollegiate harriers traveled a seven mile distance. Favored with a little time and not losing any men through graduation, the team will head toward greater things next season.

Cheer Leaders

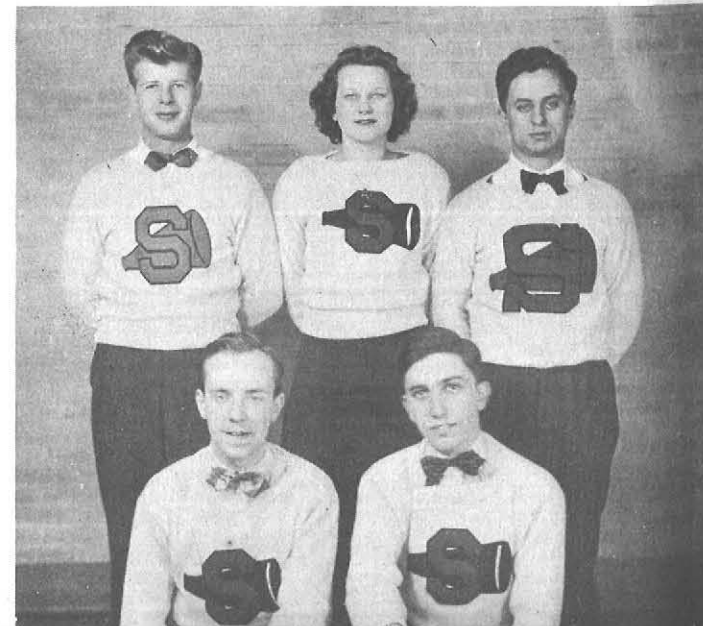
Rah, Rah, Rah

After a lapse of one year, State expects to place a strong, formidable team in the ranks of inter-collegiate tennis competition.

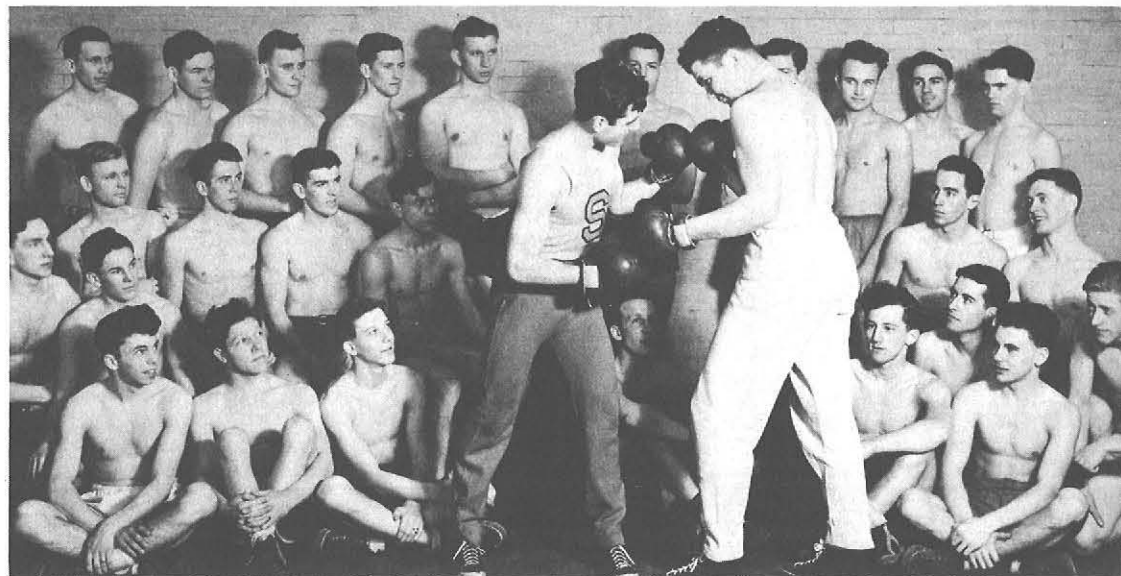

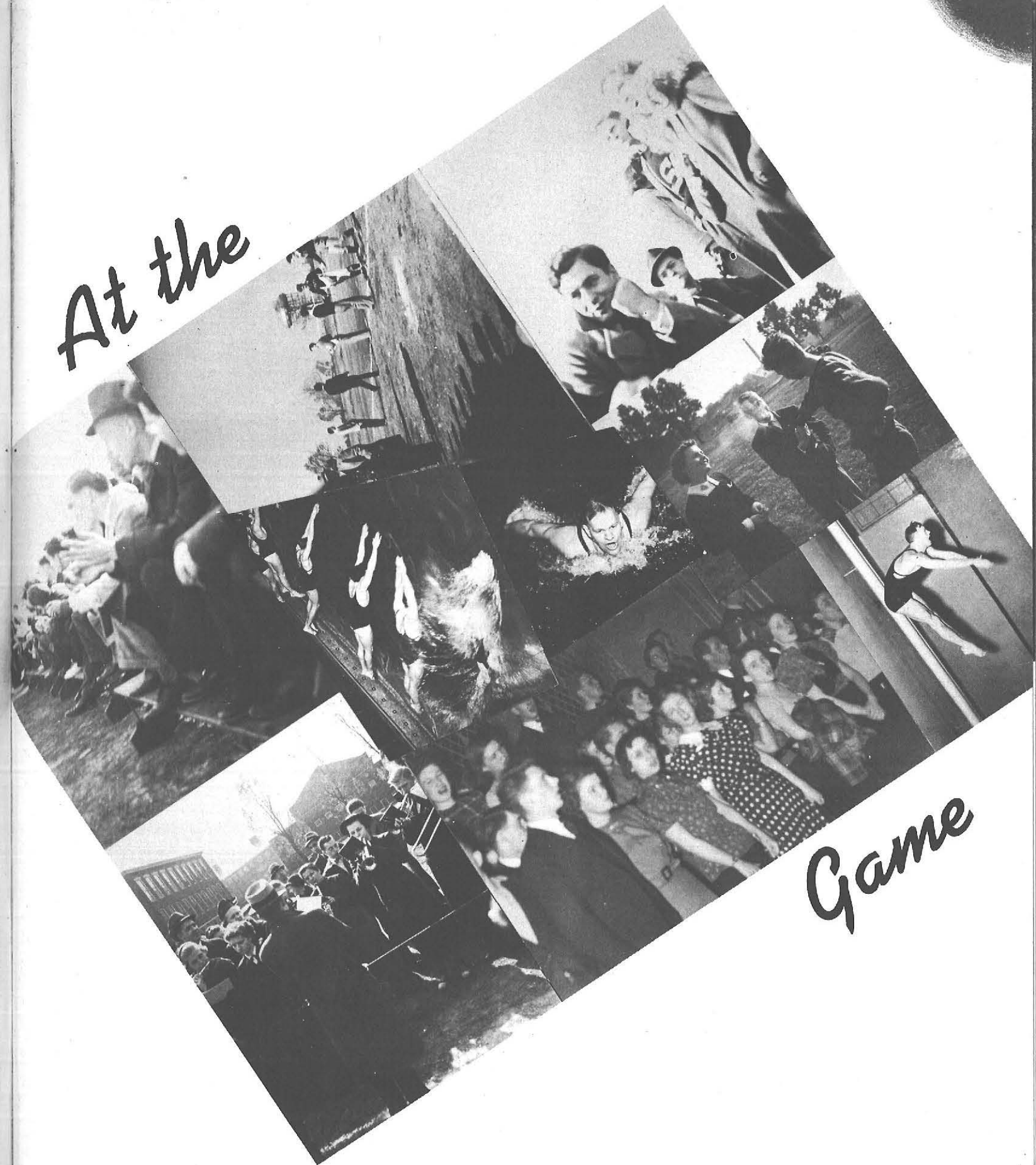

Junior-Senior Teams

At the end of each basketball season, team members vote to choose their best players to represent their section on an All-Class team. There follows an All-Soph—All-Frosh game and an All-Junior—All-Senior game. The winners of these two play each other for the final class championship. When a player has been elected to an All-Class team for three years in succession, she receives the highest insignia given for sports to State women—a gold basketball and a certificate.

Tennis

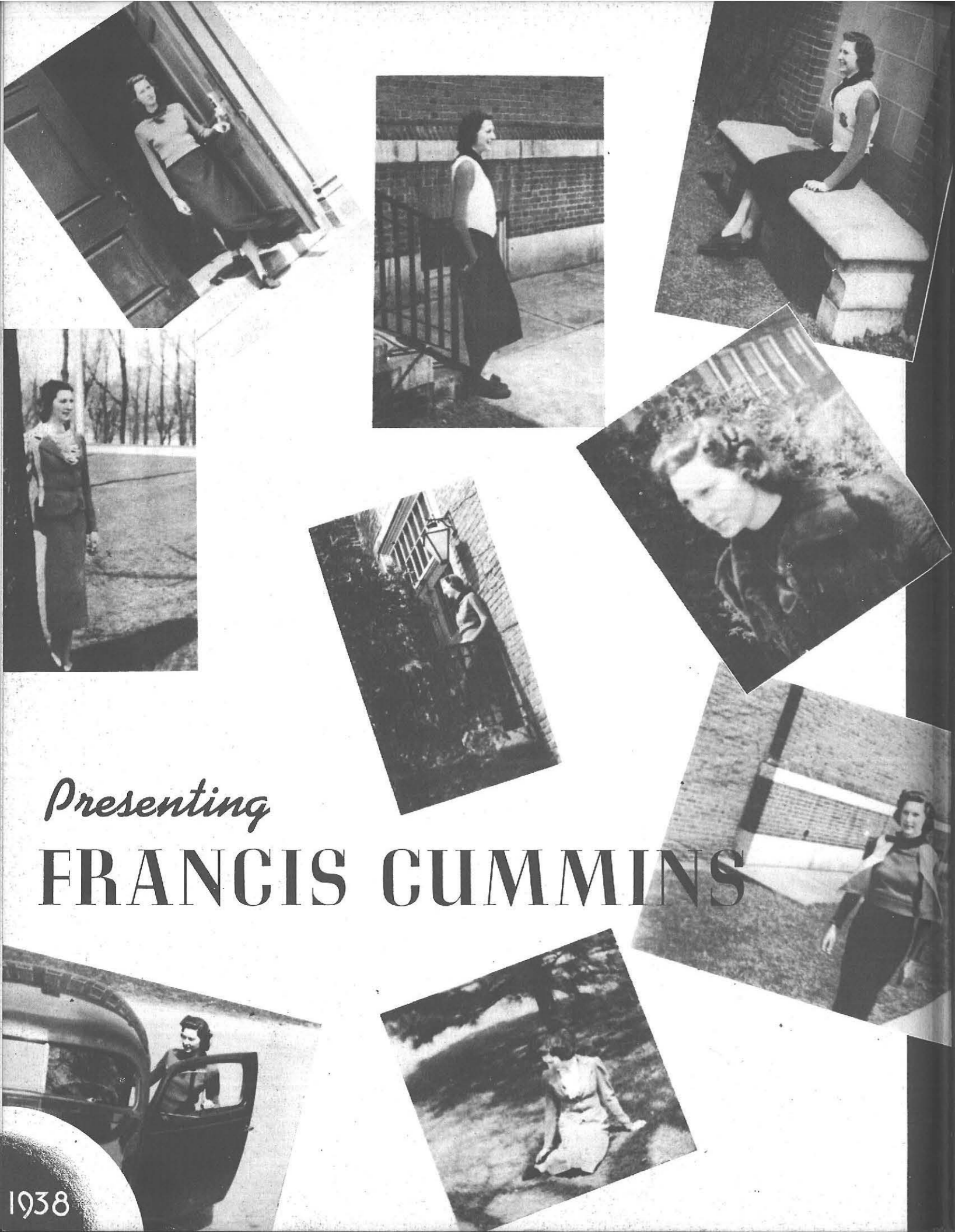
