

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:
(Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)  Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's  Parkside subdivision. House is located two blocks from  Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and east of the Zoo.
18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):  Two and a half story American Four Square form with Colonial Revival styling. Full-width flat roof porch with bowed entrance front. Brick piers support entablature with modillions under cornice. Spindle balustrade. Curved radiating stairs. Glass paneled door with leaded sidelights. Tri-part first floor windows, double hung 1/1 center with leaded sidelights  SIGNIFICANCE 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1909  STATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1909
ARCHITECT: floor 1/1 windows. Flat arch above windows. Hip
roof dormer. Three part 1/1 windows with pilaster  BUILDER: strips flanking window.
20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A brick American Four Square with Colonial Revival style details applied to facade. Summit Avenue is a truncated north-south street, located between Woodward and Crescent Avenues and extending from West Oakwood Place to the northern section of Crescent Avenue. A similar street, ending south of Jewett Avenue, appears in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." Summit Avenue was deeded to the city in 1889, except for the small section between Amherst and Crescent which was deeded in 1892. This street follows Olmsted's rule that it "not lead with special directness toward the town."
