

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
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## **Our Mission**

## **Program Notes**

#### THE SOUND OF MUSIC

Few Broadway shows are as familiar and recognizable as The Sound of Music. Popularized by the 1965 film starring Julie Andrews, the show actually first opened on Broadway in 1959 with music written by Rodgers & Hammerstein. The show follows Maria, a nun in Salzburg, Austria sent to be the governess of the seven children of a naval captain, Georg von Trapp. The plot unfolds immediately before the start of World War II, with Nazi Germany preying on surrounding countries including Austria. When Captain von Trapp is drafted into the German Navy, he faces a choice: sacrifice his identity as a proud Austrian and join the Nazis, or resist the Anschluss and flee.

The Sound of Music reinforces the importance of being true to oneself and to resist outside forces trying to change that. This is seen in Maria's character by her refusal to give in to the Captain's militaristic upbringing of his children, and in the Captain's resistance to the Nazi regime by staying true to his Austrian heritage. We reflect these themes in the LGBT community every day, by making the conscious decision to be ourselves and live our lives as LGBT men and allies despite the pressures by politics and society.

#### HAIRSPRAY

Composer Marc Shaiman helped turn John Waters' 1988 campy movie Hairspray into perfect fodder for a new Broadway musical-teenage angst, racial integration, a lot of dancing, and a whole lot of hair. Plump heroine Tracy Turnblad dreams of dancing on the Corny Collins Show, a local television dance program, but is upstaged by the prettier, but less talented, current "It-girl" Amber Von Trussle. Through Tracy's resilience, she eventually dances her way onto the show, launches a campaign to integrate the show, and gains acceptance for all teens of every size, shape, and color. The songs include 1960s-style dance music and downtown rhythm and blues. In "Welcome to the Sixties" Tracy helps her agoraphobic mother, Edna realize the world around her is changing and to let go of her past, and embrace the rhythm of a brand new day. Motormouth Maybelle, host of "Negro Day," remembers the long fight for equality in "I Know Where I've Been." A poignant, powerful, and inspiring ballad reminding us that there is a struggle we have yet to win, and to sit and do nothing would be a sin. "You Can't Stop the Beat," the shows finale, is a joyous celebration of Tracy

winning the love of heartthrob Link Larkin, and the integration of the *Corny Collins Show. Hairspray* opened on August 15, 2002 at the Neil Simon Theater in NYC and ran for 2,642 performances. The show also won the 2003 Tony Award for Best Musical, and won 8 of the 12 Tony nominations it was up for.

#### RAGTIME

Based on E.L. Doctrow's novel, Ragtime opened on Broadway in 1998. A riveting tale of families dealing with changing times and ideals at the turn of the 20th century, two of it's central characters are Coalhouse Walker Jr., a musician turned revolutionary and his young love Sarah. Living in a world where they are unequal because of the color of their skin, they are faced with many injustices. Yet when they sing "Wheels of a Dream," they can't help but have hope. Hope for the future of their son, and hope for the future of their country. When Sarah is tragically killed, Coalhouse becomes militant and angry, often resorting to retaliation and violence. And when he is at the end of his rope, he instructs his men to 'go out and tell our story' in the stirring anthem "Make Them Hear You." He realizes that the best way to enact change is to be seen and heard; to stop hiding and demand justice. The messages of "Wheels of a Dream" and "Make Them Hear You" can be keenly felt among the gay community. We need to have hope that the world can change, and that we can live our best lives until it does. Making our voices heard and refusing to be silent, we must go out and tell our stories and not let ourselves be ignored and make the changes happen.

#### "Children Will Listen" from INTO THE WOODS

Written by Stephen Sondheim for the award-winning fairy tale musical *Into the Woods*, "Children Will Listen" serves to warn us that our voices are always being heard by someone. Children can learn hatred and negativity from the mouths of adults. We teach them about whom they are and who they can become. We must be aware that we are being heard. We can teach hatred, but we can also teach love. We can teach prejudice but we can also teach acceptance. We can teach self-doubt, but we can also teach self-celebration. So be aware of what you are putting out into the world because it doesn't stop with you. "Careful the things you do, children will see and learn."

#### "I Don't Like Showtunes"

The ever witty and talented Eric Lane Barnes is a writer, composer, singer, and comedian who has a knack for writing parodies. In 2000 Barnes

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
formed the vocal ensemble Captain Smartypants, touring the Pacific Northwest and singing with the likes of Kristin Chenowith and Jennifer Holliday. In their rip-roaringly funny show, *Pantyline*, Captain Smartypants sings one of Barnes' original songs: "I Don't Like Showtunes." It is a hilarious recanting of everything annoying about show tunes put into a song that is, itself, a show tune. With a catalog of music tonight stretching all of Broadway's genres, it seems appropriate to have at least one song tailored for those of you who don't like *Hairspray* or *Wicked*.

#### LA CAGE AUX FOLLES

The Tony Award winning, *La Cage aux Folles* is one of the longest running shows on Broadway, and continues to delight audiences who fall in love with the story of Georges and Albin. Though deeply in love, the couple is faced with the outside views of loved ones who do not feel as comfortable explaining the partnership, and that test the bonds of their marriage. In "Song on the Sand" Georges confesses that no test would ever take away the feeling of being young and in love with Albin, but for the sake of his son, they must pretend, but for only a moment. The strong-willed, and proud Albin responds to Georges with the powerful showstopper "I Am What I Am" refusing to stand in the shadows. The show is a romantic comedy with a songbook that reinforces the overall theme of being proud, and surrounding yourself with those who love you for exactly who you are.

#### WICKED

Wicked: The Untold Story of Oz, has been noted as one of the most successful Broadway musicals ever produced, breaking records for award nominations, wins, and box-office proceeds. The Tony Award winning show opened on Broadway in 2003, and now is a standard for touring companies bringing the show to theatres across the country. More than two-million people have seen the captivating musical, and know the before, during, and after story of Dorothy's sudden landing in Oz, from the perspective of the witches, Elphaba and Glinda. In "One Short Day" the once quarrelsome duo Elphaba and Glinda share one magical, wondrous day exploring the Emerald City and meeting the wizard. Elphaba finally has the feeling of acceptance and belonging. However, in "I'm Not That Girl" Elphaba fights an inner mêlée with romantic feelings she is having for Fiyero, a Winkie Prince thought to be the apt partner for Glinda. It's a humbling ballad about a struggle we all face, accepting that true love, may not be well accepted among our peers. As we close the show, "For Good" finds Elphaba and Glinda once again reunited, singing a duet about how their friendship, however strained, has forever changed each of them for the better. 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

#### "Testimony"

The "It Gets Better Project" began in September 2010, as a response to the suicides of teenagers who were bullied because they were gay, or because their peers suspected they were gay. The internet based project is a collection of videos, letters, and poems contributed by people across the world of all sexual orientations with one clear, and supportive message: It Gets Better! More than 50,000 entries, and a host of other similar initiatives across the world have helped to give those struggling with thoughts of suicide an alternative; a positive and thoughtful voice affirming that it's ok to be who you are. Stephen Schwartz, legendary Broadway composer of the musical Wicked, among others, composed "Testimony" from submissions to the "It Gets Better Project," from both those contemplating suicide, and those passionately against it. The piece debuted in March of 2012, when sung by the San Francisco Gay Men's Chorus. The breathtakingly poignant piece is hailed as the "It Get's Better Anthem" and has been adopted and sung by choirs across the country in effort to bring awareness of this heart breaking truth. In "Testimony" we remind you that you're more loved than you dare to know, and it gets more than better.



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## About the Artistic Director



Ciaran Krueger is a native of Buffalo and a veteran of the concert hall and stage. He has a familiarity in a wide range of repertoire in everything from classical to gospel to musical theatre. Krueger's musical career began at age six when he joined St. Paul's Cathedral Men and Boys choir under the direction of Bruce Neswick. Since then, he has been involved in music constantly. Mr. Krueger holds a Master's of Music in Choral Conducting under

the instruction of Harold Rosenbaum at the University of Buffalo. In 2011, Mr. Krueger joined the BGMC as the organization's second Artistic Director. 


## **Come Join Us in Song**



## The Buffalo Gay Men's Chorus

At end of 1999, the vision for a Gay Men's Chorus in Buffalo was conceived. Guided by Roger Parris, a vigorous group of men explored this concept thoroughly. With the support and success of the Rochester Gay Men's Chorus behind them, these men decided that it was time for Buffalo to join the growing list of LGBT choruses all over the world.


After 15 months of intense work, a Steering Committee had written bylaws, filed papers of incorporation, raised seed money, written a mission statement and elected officers. After a thorough search, Barbara Wagner was asked to be the Founding Artistic Director and would join the ranks of only two female conductors of Gay Men's Choruses. Wagner, in turn, requested that Debi Overton-Niles be invited to serve as the Founding Accompanist.

The first auditions were held in May 2001, and rehearsals were to begin on September 11, 2001, a day of infamy in our nation. The men and Wagner held hands that first rehearsal and sang- "from you I receive, to you I give, together we share and from this we live." We also learned "How Can I Keep From Singing" and began forging the bonds that still hold us together today. "How Can I Keep From Singing" became our theme song and was the very first music our first audience heard as the Buffalo Gay Men's Chorus processed down the aisles of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Buffalo.

Our February 2002 inaugural concert, "Music From the Heart", set the tone for our future. The energy that surrounded the BGMC that night validated the reality of our beloved chorus, and the bonds we formed continue to remain strong. The audience that first night was huge- the church was filled, chairs lined the aisles and sadly, people had to be turned away at the door. Our audiences continue to be large and diverse, and we now sing three performances in each concert series.

We have been the gracious recipients of many awards, including three awards from Artvoice's "Best in Buffalo" which elected us as "Best Chorus" and the prestigious Buffalo and Erie County Arts Council Award for exceptional contributions to the arts and cultural community in Western New York. The BGMC has also been a recipient of community service awards from AIDS Community Services, and has been recognized by the Empire State Pride Agenda in 2005 with the ESPA Award for Community Service for the "excellence of their music and their dedication to the community." We have also had the tremendous honor of performing with the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra twice, once in 2004 and again in 2006 under the direction of Joann Faletta. We have also performed on the Ars Nova "Viva Vivaldi" series, by the request of Marylouise Nanna.

In December 2008, the BGMC presented its first series of holiday concerts, entitled "Hope for the Holidays." There were three totally sold out performances, and it has become a holiday tradition for the Western New York Community, including being offered the opportunity to sing each year at the lighting of the Albright Knox Christmas Tree.

At the end of the 2010-2011 season, Founding Artistic Director Barbara Wagner retired from her position as Artistic Director of the BGMC, and turned her baton over to our organizations second Artistic Director, Mr. Ciaran Krueger. Since the Fall of 2011, Mr. Krueger has led the chorus to new heights with growing audiences, new musical adventures, and dedicated musicianship.






