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
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


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




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Our Mission

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

Program Notes

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Over the Rainbow

Often referred to as "Somewhere Over the Rainbow" this piece is a classic Academy Award-winning ballad song with music by Harold Arlen and lyrics by E.Y. Harburg, both of whom are Buffalo natives. It was written for the 1939 movie, *The Wizard of Oz*, and was sung by actress Judy Garland in her starring role as Dorothy. Over time it would become Garland's signature song.

In the film, part of the song is played by the MGM orchestra over the opening credits. About five minutes into the movie, actress Judy Garland playing the lead character, Dorothy, sings "Over the Rainbow" after unsuccessfully trying to get her aunt and uncle to listen to her relate an unpleasant incident involving her dog, Toto, and the nasty spinster, Miss Gulch (Margaret Hamilton). Dorothy's Aunt Em tells her to "find yourself a place where you won't get into any trouble", prompting Dorothy to walk off by herself. She muses to Toto "Someplace where there isn't any trouble. Do you suppose there is such a place, Toto? There must be. It's not a place you can get to by a boat, or a train. It's far, far away. Behind the moon, beyond the rain…", commencing with singing the song. The song is ultimately a piece about hopes, dreams and wishes for something more.

If You Were Gay

Avenue Q is an American musical in two acts, conceived by Robert Lopez and Jeff Marx, who wrote the music and lyrics. The book was written by Jeff Whitty and the show was directed by Jason Moore and produced by Kevin McCollum, Robyn Goodman, and Jeffrey Seller. Avenue Q is an "autobiographical and biographical" coming-of-age parable, addressing and satirizing the issues and anxieties associated with entering adulthood. Its characters lament that as children, they were assured by their parents, and by children's television programs such as PBS's Sesame Street, that they were "special" and "could do anything"; but as adults, they have discovered to their surprise and dismay that in the real world their options are limited, and they are no more "special" than anyone else. The musical is also notable for the use of puppets alongside human actors. "If You Were Gay" is sung early in Act 1, when Nicky, who is straight, suspects that Rod is gay, and assures Rod it is okay with him if he is; but Rod insists he is not.

Not While I'm Around

Stephen Sondheim's *Sweeney Todd* is widely regarded as the finest musical of the second half of the 20th Century. The infamously shadowy, bitter and blackly humorous work has long been admired by director Tim Burton, who

trimmed the famed score and cast a superb Johnny Depp in the title role in the 2007 film version of the musical. "Not While I'm Around" reminds you of the power of hope and a promise for protection and solace: "No one's gonna hurt you, no one's gonna dare. Others can desert you, not to worry; whistle, I'll be there."

The Longest Time

"The Longest Time" is a doo-wop single by Billy Joel. The song was released as a single in 1984 as the fourth single from the album *An Innocent Man*. It reached number fourteen on the *Billboard* Hot 100 and number one on *Billboard*'s Adult Contemporary chart. Overseas, the song went to number twenty-five on the UK Singles Chart. The original song features Billy Joel and lead and all backing vocals. Joel recorded 14 different background tracks which were mixed into the song.

Ständchen

Franz Schubert wrote the dreamy *Ständchen (Serenade)* at the end of his brief life. *Ständchen* is considered one of the most beautiful melodies in the world, and is one of Schubert's most well known songs. It is from a collection of songs published after his death, aptly titled by his publisher Schwanengesang (Swan Song):

"Hesitantly, quietly, in the dark's nocturnal stillness, we are here. And with fingers gently bent, lightly, lightly we knock at our sweetheart's chamber door. But now increasing, swelling, rising, with a loud, united voice, we call out confidently: 'Sleep not when the voice of affection speaks!' Once a wise man with a lantern searched far and near for friends. How much rarer than gold are people who are gracious and kind. So, when friendship or love speaks, friend, sweetheart, do not sleep! But what in all the world would be comparable to sleep? So, instead of words and gifts, you shall now also have rest. One more little greeting, one more word! The joyful melody becomes silent; quietly, quietly, again we steal away."



According to John Lennon, the song's close musical resemblance to Ludwig van Beethoven's "Moonlight Sonata" was no coincidence. He said, "Yoko was playing Beethoven's 'Moonlight Sonata' on the piano ... I said, 'Can you play those chords backwards?', and wrote 'Because' around them. The lyrics speak for themselves ... No imagery, no obscure references." Our version, arranged by Artistic Director Ciaran Krueger, takes apart the accompaniment and

triple dubbed voices of Lennon, Harrison and McCartney and assigns each part/voice to one line. Originally recorded in 1969, the song appeared on the "Abbey Road" album.

Color of Colorado

Written by Dick Gallagher, with lyrics by Mark Waldrop, for the humorous, offbeat 1996 musical, *When Pigs Fly*, this delightful musical romp gleefully enumerates the many reasons why "you need '*us*' to make the U.S. great!" We sing this song as a celebration of who we are and our place in our country as "doctors, lawyers, movers, shakers, friends of neighbors and policy makers" as it poses the question "Don't you realize who WE are?"

I Am That Man

The text of this stunningly uplifting ballad was inspired by President Obama's inaugural address. It calls men to take a stand, "to arise to love, arise to lead, arise to serve, no matter what the need." Set in a stirring ballad style, it builds steadily towards the climactic ending, stating "I am that man."

Chorus of Gipsies

The Anvil Chorus is the English term for the Coro di zingari (Italian Gypsy chorus), a piece of music from Act 2, Scene 1 of Giuseppe Verdi's Il trovatore (The Troubador, 1853) which depicts Spanish Gypsies striking their anvils at dawn – hence its English name – and singing the praises of hard work, good wine, and their Gypsy women . . . our take on this brings it to an all male world of dominance, hard work and men. In American sporting events of the early twentieth century, the Anvil Chorus was commonly sung by the spectators or played by a band when a player, especially an opponent, committed an error, or to "rub it in" to the losing side.

I'm Gonna Wash That Man Right Outa My Hair

"I'm Gonna Wash That Man Right Outa My Hair" is a song from the musical *South Pacific*, sung by Nellie Forbush, the female lead, originally played by Mary Martin in the Broadway version, beginning in 1949. Her character, fed up with a man (Emile De Becque) and singing in the shower, claims she will forget about him. Her friends show her support by harmonizing. (Can you see where the BGMC is going with our version?) The song was written by Oscar and Hammerstein in response to Mary Martin's request. She had starred on broadway for years and "had never washed her hair on stage" and said she wanted to give it a try.

Danny Boy

There are various theories as to the true meaning of "Danny Boy". Some listeners have interpreted the song to be a message from a parent to a son going off to war or leaving as part of the Irish diaspora. The 1918 version

of the sheet music included alternative lyrics ("Eily Dear"), with the instructions that "when sung by a man, the words in italic should be used; the song then becomes "Eily Dear", so that "Danny Boy" is only to be sung by a lady". In spite of this, it is unclear whether this was Lyricist Frederic Weatherly's intent, or simply a publisher's note; Weatherly did, however, acknowledge that "Danny Boy" was sung "all over the world by Sinn Feiners and Ulstermen alike", and noted that the song had "nothing of the rebel song in it, and no note of bloodshed". Originally written for a different tune, Lyricist Frederic Weatherly modified the lyrics to fit the popular tune "Londonderry Air".

Lass dich nur nichts nicht dauren

This motet was composed around 1859, when Brahms was a choral conductor in Hamburg, Germany. It is a double canon, with the Tenor 1 and Baritone parts in counterpoint with the Tenor 2 and Bass parts. The remarkably expressive piece is dedicated to Clara Schumann after her husband Robert was confined to an asylum. (The introduction quotes from Robert Schumann's Fourth Symphony, which he had dedicated to Clara.) The final "Amen" abandons the canon and unfolds over a held low E-flat from the organ.

"Let nothing ever grieve you; be at peace. Whatever God ordains, accept it gladly, my soul! Why do you want to worry today about tomorrow? The One who is lord of all; he also gives to you that which is yours. In all things be not inconstant; stand firmly. Whatever God ordains is and signifies the best. Amen."

Get Me to the Church On Time

"Get Me to the Church on Time" is a song composed by Frederick Loewe, with lyrics written by Alan Jay Lerner for the 1956 musical *My Fair Lady*, where it was introduced by Stanley Holloway. It is sung by the cockney character Alfred P. Doolittle, a dustman, the father of the show's main character Eliza Doolittle. He has received a surprise bequest of four thousand pounds a year from an American millionaire, raising him to middle-class respectability. Consequently he feels he must marry Eliza's "stepmother", the woman he has been "living in sin" with for many years. Doolittle and his friends have one last spree before the wedding and the song is a plea to his friends not to let his drunken merriment forget his good intentions and make sure he gets to his wedding.

One Hand, One Heart

West Side Story is an American musical with a book by Arthur Laurents, music by Leonard Bernstein, lyrics by Stephen Sondheim, and conception and choreography by Jerome Robbins. It was inspired by William Shakespeare's play Romeo and Juliet. The story is set in the West 50s and West 60s of the Upper West Side neighborhood in New York City in the mid-1950s, an ethnic, blue-collar neighborhood. (In the early 1960s much of the neighborhood would be cleared in an urban renewal project for Lincoln Center, changing the neighborhood character.) The musical explores the rivalry between the Jets and the Sharks, two teenage street gangs of different ethnic backgrounds. The members of the Sharks from Puerto Rico are taunted by the Jets, a white working-class group. The young protagonist, Tony, one of the Jets, falls in love with Maria, the sister of Bernardo, the leader of the Sharks. The dark theme, sophisticated music, extended dance scenes, and focus on social problems marked a turning point in American musical theatre. "One Hand, One Heart" appears at the end of Act 1, when our two star-crossed lovers, Tony and Maria, sing to each other at the bridal shop where they dream of their wedding. Our arrangement, arranged by Artistic Director Ciaran Krueger, takes the song and makes it more universal, as we, the men of the BGMC, sing this song about a hope and a love that we all dream of

Why We Tell the Story

The Caribbean re-telling of Hans Christian Anderson's *The Little Mermaid*, the musical *Once On this Island* is a brilliant love story that defies the social customs which consume everyday society. The idea that love can conquer over every other aspect of human existence gives this controversial story meaning. This selection from the musical, was artfully and lovingly arranged for the BGMC by Steve Milloy as we celebrate the end of our first season with our second Artistic Director, Ciaran Krueger and as we travel to the GALA festival in Denver, Colorado in July 2012. The messages of hope, faith, love and common ties that bind ring true in this joyous anthem, as we celebrate the notion that "Our lives become the stories that we weave." This exciting conclusion to our concert series broadcasts the powerful message that:



She has assisted in preparing

choruses and soloists for such conductors as Tamara Brooks, John Nelson, Robert Shaw and Sergei Commissiona. Additionally, she has coached with coach/accompanists David Garvey, John Wustman, Brooks Smith, Dalton Baldwin, and the local master, Livingston Gearhart.

Ms. Overton has accompanied Master Classes for Luciano Pavarotti, Phyllis Curtin, Jessye Norman, Leontyne Price and Sylvia McNair. She has accompanied the regional Metropolitan Opera auditions in Greensboro, NC; Atlanta, GA; Philadelphia, PA; and New York City.

Debi is a past chair of the Music Commission of the WNY Episcopal Diocese and is a current member of the WNY chapter of the American Guild of Organists. She was also a member of the Board of Directors of AGO and continues to be active in WNY serving as guest organist/ choirmaster at several local churches. In addition, she enjoys guest conducting, accompanying and both coaching performing with singers

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




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History of the

Buffalo Gay Men's Chorus

Historically, gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgendered (GLBT) persons have seldom had a "voice", a comprehensive, recognized presence with full participation in the American culture. Today, however, GLBT choruses are flourishing. The Gay and Lesbian Association of Choruses (GALA), the national support organization for GLBT singing groups, celebrated its 25th anniversary in 2008. The passage of New York State's Sexual Orientation Non-Discrimination Act (2003) and Marriage Equality Act (2011), as well as the rising success of the Buffalo Gay Men's Chorus are three examples of many developments changing history for the better.

The BGMC idea was first conceived in 1999. Guided by Roger Parris (still one of our singers), a vigorous group of men worked throughout the coming year to make the BGMC organization a reality. With the support of the Rochester Gay Men's Chorus to encourage them, a steering committee consisting of twelve or more dedicated members had written the by-laws and incorporation papers, held fundraisers for seed money, agreed on a mission statement, elected officers and directors and (after a thorough search) hired Barbara Wagner as BGMC's Artistic Director. She, in turn, arranged the appointment of Debi Overton as our charter accompanist. Both women are highly respected musicians. Barbara Wagner was one of only two female conductors of over 150 gay men's choruses in the United States and Canada.

Auditions were held in May 2001, with 36 chorus members on board after the first day. Soon, there were over 50. Rehearsals began on September 11, 2001, a day of shock and sadness throughout our land. The difficult decision to go forward with the rehearsal, despite the tragedy of that day, proved to have been wise. Forty men, many not knowing each other, gathered in an eerie silence. As they and Ms. Wagner held hands for the first time in a community circle, there were anguished murmurs of meditation, grief and prayer. They sang ... (*"From you I receive, to you I give, together we share and from this we live"*). They learned that long-lived and classic American hymn, *"How Can I Keep From Singing?"*. It remains to this day the Chorus theme song and a continuing reminder for its members of the mutual family togetherness and inspiration that the Chorus always aspires to attain. It was the processional music at the opening of BGMC's first public concert (*"Music From the Heart"*) on February 9, 2002. The men of the Chorus, singing this song with feeling and intensity, strode down the aisles of the Unitarian Universalist Church in Buffalo, with uninvited (but welcome) television news cameras recording the event.

The audience that night was huge -- the Church was filled, chairs lined the aisles and, sadly, people had to be turned away at the door. All concerts after that were offered twice in each performance weekend until, some years later, the Chorus began presenting three times in the weekend and, for a short time, with three weekend presentations each year instead of two. Audiences continue to be large, diverse and enthusiastic.

The Chorus has commissioned a number of compositions and special arrangements of music for its concerts. Two of them were especially commissioned for performance by the Chorus at the quadrennial Festival of GLBT choruses from all around the United States, Canada and elsewhere. The Chorus commissioned Adamic Songs, a six-part composition featuring poems by Walt Whitman, the creation of Buffalo's Roland E. Martin. Yes!, was based on a poem about the struggle for racial harmony, by Countee Cullen, the Harlem Renaissance writer in the early 1900's. Yes! was composed by the renowned Adolphus Hailstork, also on BGMC's commission. The Chorus performed these new works at the Festivals of over 100 GLBT Choruses at, respectively, Montreal in 2004 and Miami in 2008.

The Chorus has also enjoyed remarkable creative support from other Buffalo composers and arrangers. Madeline Davis, longtime leader of the GLBT movement in Buffalo and founder of the GLBT Archives, has provided the Chorus with many poignant tunes and texts. Along with many of the GALA composers, Buffalo's Phil Sims, musician extraordinaire, has composed many beautiful arrangements for the Chorus. And Marty Wimmer, a very capable and creative spirit with his moving words and music, continues as a faithful contributor to the BGMC repertoire.

Along with its efforts and growing musical success, BGMC has received honors in many forms and venues. A number of awards from Artvoice's "Best in Buffalo" proclaimed the Chorus the best local choral group. The Chorus was asked to sing on the Kleinhans Music Hall stage with the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra on two occasions, once for a subscription concert in 2004 and another as a benefit for the Orchestra and the Olmsted Conservancy in 2006, with Maestra JoAnn Falletta conducting. Mary Louise Nanna, founder and conductor of Ars Nova, asked the Chorus to

sing in her Viva Vivaldi Series. BGMC was recognized by the Empire State Pride Agenda in 2005 with the ESPA Award for Community Service awarded to the Chorus for the excellence of its music and its dedication to the community. In March 2008, BGMC was chosen to receive the prestigious Buffalo and Erie County Arts Council Award for exceptional contributions to the arts and cultural community in Western New York.

BGMC's success has brought many requests from worthy organizations to perform benefit concerts, and the Chorus attempts to honor these requests to the extent that it is able to do so. The Chorus has received grants and gifts and much support from both the GLBT community and the community at large. It is pleased to be able to reciprocate.

A major force in the BGMC success has been the impressive dedication, hard work and unflagging efforts by the Chorus singers, as well as the dedication of its non-singing members and volunteers.

The Chorus understands the need to create a positive social impact in the affected communities as effectively and meaningfully as possible. It finds itself in a relatively conservative environment, a factor that, if anything, should make its efforts and impact all the more important, and, it continues to hope, all the more effective. In addition to its influence on the community at large, it is clear that the Chorus has helped raise the self esteem of an historically marginalized portion of our society. Its high profile has helped to create a positive model for those who are grappling with the negativity that is too often imposed on GLBT people.

The Buffalo Gay Men's Chorus takes great pride in what it has been able to do and accomplish in the first ten years of its existence. Probably the greatest accomplishment has been its success in weaving the different lives and personalities of its members and of the communities it serves through the tug and magic of music, sung from the heart. The Chorus is, truly, a family. We are delighted to have all of you join us in that bonding company, as you listen to our song.

As we celebrate our 10th anniversary season, we welcome our second Artistic Director, Ciaran Krueger, to the BGMC family. We also welcome back charter accompanist, Debi Overton, to the BGMC family.

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




