

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district) Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located three blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.
Two and a half story with Prairie School influence. Hip roof with exposed rafter tails under extending eave. Curved knee brackets. Full-width flat-roof porch. Brackets under extending eave. Paired square tapered supports with column elaboration. Stick balustrade. Glass paneled door flanked by leaded sidelights. SIGNIFICANCE First floor tri-part 1/1 window. Clapboard first floor. Second floor has pair semi-hexagonal bays. 1/1 windows ARCHITECT: with entablature surround. Lighted porch door in
northern bay. Shingle second floor. Hip roof dormer BUILDER: with a set of paired 1/1 windows. Exposed rafter tails under eave.
HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A typical residence that utilizes Prairie School influence and minimum application of Craftsman style details. Originally the Buffalo and Williamsville Macadam Road, Main Street was a pre-existing street at the time Olmsted designated it as the eastern border for "The Parkside." While the streets within the subdivision were designed specifically to avoid commercial development, this portion of Main Street became a combination of commercial and residential structures. It was also a major thoroughfare into the city, allowing easy access to downtown from this suburban neighborhood.
