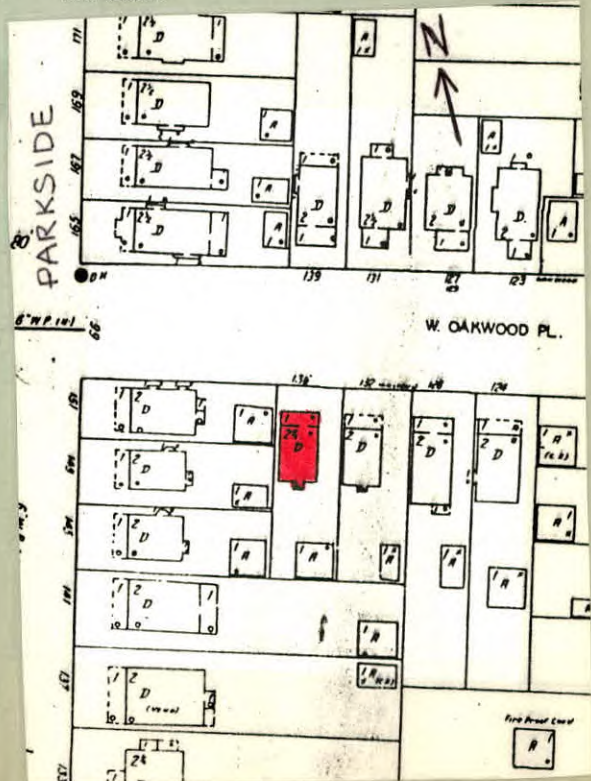

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

Building is situated on a standard sized corner lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located one block from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):

Two and a half story frame with Colonial Revival styling. Side gable roof with cornice end returns. Full-width gabled, enclosed porch. Six-light wood paneled door. Paneled transom. Left bay has three single-light windows with single-light transom. Five windows in right bay. Paneled gable. Second floor has two semi-hexagonal bays. Double hung 1/1 windows.

SIGNIFICANCE

19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1908 Entablature window surround.

ARCHITECT: _____ Band of trim below roof eave. Fluted end Doric pilasters. Two gabled dormers. Bargeboard with

BUILDER: flared ends. Double hung 12/1 windows. Entablature window head.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A Colonial Revival style with the addition of a Craftsman style porch. West Oakwood Place extends from Main Street to Parkside Avenue. At the northern border of the first section of the subdivision to be developed, the eastern portion of West Oakwood was deeded to the city by Jacob Davis in 1887 and the remainder by Caroline Jewett in 1888. West Oakwood closely resembles a street found in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." While it does not connect with Jewett Avenue at the park entrance as Olmsted originally planned, it remains curvilinear and as a cross street provides easy access to the main thoroughfares and the park.
