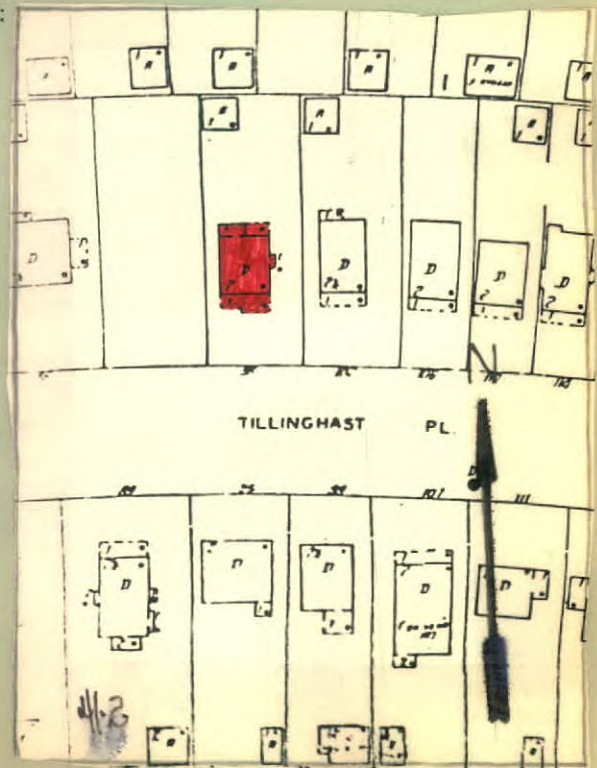

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

(Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)

This building located at the eastern end of a long curvilinear east-west block is situated on a large size building lot withing Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. Single family residences, c. 1915; American Four Square, Prairie, with moderate size front lawns line the street. The grounds of the Buffalo Zoological Society are located one block to the south.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):

Two and one half story American Four Square. Hip roof with extending eaves. Full-length front porch, hip roof with hip roof projection. Square supports and paneled balustrade. Glass and wood paneled door with multi-light sidelights. First floor tri-part window, full-length, 8 lights each. Second floor has a set of paired square-headed windows, 9/1 lights. Hip roof dormer has a pair of 9/1 windows.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

Typical American Four Square. The street takes its name from James Tillinghast, owner of the property up until July 15, 1889 when it was conveyed to George L. Thorne and Byron Angell, to be subdivided for residential use. The subdivision named "Meadow View Park" carried restrictive covenants in its deeds of sale. The restrictions set forth minimum house costs and minimum measures for street frontage. The homes on Tillinghast were to be of "tasteful design" and the cost was not to be less than \$3,000. The street reflects Olmsted's philosophy regarding roadways located within a subdivision; Tillinghast is a broad, long roadway with no intersecting thoroughfares, running east to west "with no special directness toward the town."
