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North Ridge United Methodist Church

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On January 2, 1941, there were 33 names on the Charter Member Roll of the Women's Society of Christian Service. Rev. Frank White installed the officers. Of those 33 members, five are still living and are all members of our now United Methodist Women. They are Dora Wakeman, Historian, Gertrude Luff, Agnes Lester, Miriam Robinson and Marie Luff.

The officers were as follows: President, Laura Freatman, Vice-President Ruth Robinson, 2nd Vice President, Mabel Schulze, Secretary, Dora Wakeman, Corresponding Secretary, Mary Luff and Treasurer, Florence Lafler.

The meetings at the time were held in the homes of the members, the first being held at Sadie Robinsons. Since that time, the Society has continued to support missions and the church. then

1941-51--Dime card parties and bazaars with fish ponds, food, fun and fancy sales were a few of the projects used for fund raisers. It was noted that Florence Lafler received 1 coupon for 1# of sugar. to be used as needed for the WSCS. Suppers were held at the monthly meetings. The price was raised from .35¢ to .50¢. A velvet wall hanging was bought for the church in 1943. In 1951, the kitchen was remodeled at a cost of \$328.00.

1952-62--In 1951, Dora Wakeman and Florence Jacobs were appointed to investigate a more sanitary lavatory for the church. This project was completed and all committees thanked and dismissed in 1954. A lace tablecloth was purchased and the pew cushions covered. In 1956 the 15th anniversary of the WSCS was celebrated. The slogan was Looking Backward--Thinking Forward.

Some of the ways the WSCS earned their money in this decade was a smorgasboard, selling knives, white elephant sale, baked goods at sold at monthly meetings, spring luncheon & Roast Beef Supper.

In 1957, we had a "fried chicken" supper. After the first table had eaten, the chicken was all gone and we had to go out on the "high-ways & by-ways" for chicken and other meat. We made \$207.00 anyway.

Fun was the name of the game at some of our meetings. A fashionable model in the person of Lillian Truesdell attended <u>a meetin</u>g wearing high button shoes, which she borrowed from Lafler's store and a hat made of flowers someone left at the church. We also brought closed boxes of clothes:dress, hat and purse and auctioned them off. The clothes were worn to the next meeting and we had some well-dressed ladies.

We enjoyed a modeling of nylons purchased at Laflers store for 79¢ a pair. Again Lillian was an excellent model.

municorary & pettman Center Term.

We sent \$5.00 to Myra Wakeman for Christmas. In a thank-you note she stated she bought a dress for the money.

In order to bring new "hair-do's to the girls at Williamsville home, we donated \$25.00 We also planted a Sycamore tree at the home.

During this year, an anniversary was held--the 25th birthday of an organization-The Womens Society of Christian Service. What is the real measure of time? What is the significance of twenty-five years of life? A corporate life of twenty-five years-such as that of the WSCS is young enough to be eager about the future and old enough to be wistful about the past. The women in the church have been part of two decades of a series of events. These have been times to cause people to seek religion and Americans have poured into churches and synagogues in unprecented number-a result of wars and violence. During these last 25 years, Methodist women have given more than \$195 million to missions through the Womens Division and more through the churches general program.

In 1966, a thanksgiving dinner was served to 430 by the women. Our profit was \$460.00 and \$217.90 from the bazaar. Another fund raiser was a fish supper--charge was \$1.00 Profit \$67.51

On October 3, 1968, the regular meeting was held in the form of a reorganization meeting. An impressive charter program was delivered by Leetah Brown. It officially made us the Women's Society of the UMC. All present and active members were declared charter members.

In 1973, we voted to attend the Summit Mall Sale for the 1st time. We cleared \$360.00 on crafts, baked goods + dry plouened weeds

1974-84

We received \$191.00 from the Alley Dusterd Bowling project that was the brain-child of Blanche Wilson & Ruth Luff. This project netted the society & goodly amount over the years. Once again the seat cushions were covered. Diane Peck reported the cost to be \$438.48. The women will do the work. The UMW will help the church in this project.

In 1977, a committee was appointed for funeral luncheons.

In January 1983, we held a primary meeting of the cookbook committee. The group headed by Beth Smith, included Diane Peck, June Schuman, Gloria Snyder, with illustrations by Connie Moore.

Blanche Wilson gave us a bit of history on a quilt that was made prior to 1983 and donated to the East Wilson Church by a Mrs Mary Miles who lived on the Coomer Road. Several years later, Agnes Drewes laundered it, Iva Hochadel had a backing put on it and Betty Stimson of Wilson did the quilting (without charge.) It was sold for \$200.00 at the Summit Mall Sale.

In April of 1984, a sacrificial meal was held as part of the regular meeting. This meal represents the sacrifice we as christians are to make as we take up our cross to follow Jesus daily. The unoccupied chair at the head of the table symbolizes the living spirit of Christ ever present with those who take the bread and the cup in memory of him. Foods included unleavened bread, bitter herb, lamb, parsley, nuts and apples, hard boiled eggs, raisins, grapes, dates, olives and figs and grape juice. Planning this meal was Jeannie Smith, Carole Doebler and Beth Smith.

1985-1997

We save Campbell soup labels which are donated to Gateway, collect Tops, Jubilee and Quality tapes and save cancelled postage stamps as part of our fund raisers. We have sold dish cloths, napkins and scented candles, held Easter candy sales and participated in the Summit Mall Do-Gooders Bazaar, and received moneys from a monday morning bowling group.

We have given to the City Mission, Ronald McDonald house, Gateway, Niagara Falls City Mission, House of God Church, Niagara Hospice, Gifts to the Christian Caring Center, Salvation Army, Service Center, Angel Tree project, U.M.C.O.R., School of Mission and have made Migrant Kits. We have held Bible Studies, made bibs and booties for the V.A. Hospital and published and sold cookbooks.

We feel the need for new and younger members and just recently have been blessed by several young women joining our organization.

The following was taken from "How Methodism Was Introduced To North Ridge" and was written by Dora C. Wakeman, Historian. Rev. William H. Horner was the Pastor.

As I read the records of this church, the old saying comes to my mind, "Behind every successful man stands a devoted woman." Well, here were the women of the church. Always the Ladies Aid gave this for the support of the church or that toward the preacher's salary or something to fix a roof. They raised money in many ways from teas and ice cream socials to the present bazaars, rummage sales and dinners. Of course they changed their name many times:

1864 - Social Aid Society - Pres. Mrs. M.S. Hurd 1882 - Ladies Aid Society of M.E. Church - Pres. Fannie Coe (dues 10¢) 1916 - Womens Association - Pres. Mrs. Burt Lafler 1941 - Womens Society of Christian Service - Pres. Laura Freatman 1973 - United Methodist Women - Pres. Adelia Hendricks

No matter what they called themselves, the support was still there.

The minutes of the Ladies Aid Society of April 15, 1881, began like this: "And on the fifteenth of the 4th month that honorable body termed the 'Ladies Society' met at the home of Mrs. Peterson. And not/ it chanced that the roads were exceedingly fine and the night a very beautiful one, with moonlight and starlight enhancing its lovliness and rendering its charm wholly irresistable, therefore it was not at all surprising, in view of the social, literary, musical and appetizing treats also in store, that the number in attendance was much greater than usual."

I called our own secretary and she begins her minutes "After a very delicious supper, the meeting was called to order by the president." I think we are very fortunate to have the minutes of meetings that were held so long ago in the 1800's. They will grow more valuable as time goes on.

Through the years there have been many auxillary organizations, among them the W.C.T.U. (Women's Christian Temperance Union), L.T.L. (Loyal Temperance Union), Epworth League which became the Methodist Youth Fellowship, a Men's Club (interdenominational) and a Community Club.

The first society was organized February 5th 1864. It was called the "Social Aid Society" and consisted of seventeed members, both men and women. The following officers were elected: Mrs. M.S. Hurd, President, Fannie B. Coe, Vice-President: Annie M. Beach, Secretary and Mrs Bradford Brace, Treasurer. On January 13th, 1882, the Society was reorganized and the name changed to "Ladies Aid Society," with Fannie B. Coe, President: Mrs Allen, Vice President: Mrs McCartney, Secretary, and Mrs. Melinda Miles, Treasurer.

1921-41 ming

Of those 29 members, five are still living and are all members of our now United Methodist Women. They are Dora Wakeman, Historian, Gertrude Luff, Agnes Lester, Miriam Robinson and Marie Luff.

The officers were as follows: President, Laura Freatman, Vice-President, Ruth Robinson, 2nd Vice President, Mabel Schulze, Secretary, Dora Wakeman, Corresponding Secretary, Mary Luff and Treasurer, Florence Lafler.

These meetings were held in the homes of the members, the first being held at Sadie Robinsons. Since that time the Society has continued to support missios⁵ and the church and youth by having a variety of fund raisers.

- 46-47 Florence Lafler appointed to obtain sugar through the ration board. Florence reported she received 1 coupon for 1# of sugar. Later received 1 more coupon for 1# more of sugar. Mrs. Schutte offered to donate sugar for the picnic. Adelia Hendricks, Donna Robinson and Anabell Freatman welcomed as new members.

Bought new table silverware that was stamped by Don Lafler. Prepared and sent a box to a Belgian family.

- 48-49 This year we bought 25# of sugar to be distributed to anyone who would make candy for the sale. Price of suppers raised from 35¢ to 50¢. Melissa Mollosky joined this date.
- 50-51 10th Anniversary of the WSCS. Dora Wakeman and Florence Jacobs appointed to investigate and make a report about a more sanitary lavatory for the church.

Motion to give \$50.00 to the organ fund if needed. Gwen Wright and Manice Rogers appointed to see about refinishing 2 antique tables.

Feb 1951, we enjoyed using the remodeled kitchen. Cost was \$328.00. 52-53 Strawberry festival held: also smorgasboard & small bazaar. (\$356.00)

54-55 In February, our lavatory was completed and all committees thanked and dismissed.

Agnes Doebler reported she and Lillian Truesdell had purchased a lace tablecloth to be used by the church.

Pew cushions covered. Held a dollar project. Father and son's banquet held. (\$65.15)

- 55-56 15th anniversary celebrated of WSCS-Charter members and past presidents each recived a lovely carnation. Slogan was Looking Backward--Thinking Forward.
- 56-57 Projects--Smorgasboard, Selling knives, white elephant sale, baked goods at monthly meetings, spring luncheon, group projects and a roast beef on Kummelwick special.

Gave \$50.00 to Sharon Schurr to help with her eyes.

Purchased 4 new folding tables.
