

Th	e street takes its name from James Tillinghast, owner of the property up until
Ju	ly 15, 1889 when it was conveyed to George L. Thorne and Byron Angell, to be
	bdivided for residential use. The subdivision named "Meadow View Park" carried
	strictive covenants in its deeds of sale. The restrictions set forth minimum
	ruse costs and minimum measures for street frontage. The homes on Tillinghast
we	ere to be of "tasteful design" and the cost was not to be less than \$3,000.

The street reflects Olmsted's philosophy regarding roadways located within a subdivision; Tillinghast is a broad, long roadway with no intersecting thoroughfares,
