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

AN ALL THE WEEK PROGRAM FOR THE CHURCH

Just WHEN, WHERE, and HOW an individual or an institution is to labor must be determined, in very large measure by the nature and importance of the work to be done.

There are individuals and institutions that work just a few hours a day; there are those who work all day and cease at night; and there are still others that work all day and all night, every day in the week. The Hospital, the Hotel, the Drug Store and the up to date Garage are institutions that are open and do business day and night seven days in the week.

Those who run these institutions tell us that they have an all the week program because the demand for their service justifies it.

All these institutions are catering exclusively to man's material needs.

The function of the church is and always has been to INSPIRE, INSTRUCT, and CONSTRUCT. And these obligations are to all men, saints and sinners.

While other institutions care exclusive for the material needs of man, the church should be and must be interested in all the needs of man. Hence the wisdom, and indeed the necessity of the church being at it day and night seven days in the week.

For a long long time most of the church has been satisfied to do inspirational work, and this has been and is especially true with our racial group.

Our church buildings and form of worship have been designed with the sole aim of inspiring the people. The people have accordingly gone elsewhere for their information and instruction and edification.

In the furure the church that would serve any considerable number of the people especially in the urban centers, must be interested in and make

provision for all the needs of man. For there are so many agencies working for man's material good with which the church has to compete if she would have a chance to help men spiritually. The church must be interested in the INDUSTRIAL, FINANCIAL, POLITICAL, RECREATIONAL, INTELLECTUAL, MORAL and RELIGIOUS life of man.

Our church program should be such as would be recognized by the community chest in our great cities; for our churches are expected to contribute to this fund.

An all the week program might be some thing like this:

1-A modern church building, with Pastor's Office and Pastor's Study properly fitted up with Phone, Type Writer, Printing or Doublicating machine, Stationery, and proper help.

2-Departments under efficient Leaders.

3-An adequate budget.

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And if it seem evil unto you to serve the Lord, choose you this day whom ye will serve: whether the gods which your fathers served that were on the other side of the flood, or the gods of the Amorites, in whose land ye dwell: but as for me and my house, we will serve the Lord. The people of God have many rich possessions inherited from God. But we are proned to minimize and undervalue possessions so inherited. And we spend our time and energy in our endeavors to obtain other possessions in which we think is found real value.

It is well for us, the people of God, very often to run over the catalogue of our God-given possessions. In this catalogue we shall find Faith, Hope, Love, Willpower, Patience, Courage; and many others. But the possession that we wish to consider at this time is,

RELIGIOUS INFLUENCE

To have mother's day is indeed a great idea. in celebrating this day we have done but a very small part of our duty when we have put on a red or a white carnation, given a few sentimental kisses and said a number of flatering complimentary things about mothers.

Our text gives us briefly the history of an ideal mother and an ideal child. Let us see what this mother, Hannah, did to make her ideal:-

1-She asked God for her child.

2-She gave her child to the Lord.

- 3-She sought proper environment and association for her child.
- 4-She personally concerned herself about her child's dress.
- 5-She set her child a good example, she went periodically where her son could see her and his father offer the annual sacrifice.

So in order to live as Christ has taught us we learn, that we must offer our bodies a living sacrifice, holy acceptable unto God. We see therefore, that christian living cost all that we are and all that we possess. Have we virtues, as Patience, Courage, Faith and Hope? We are to invest these in our christian Life, that it may be rich and full. Have we Prestiege, Influence, Power? Lay these on the altar of our christian Life also. Have we Physical Strength, Temporal Position, and Material Substance? God demands these also if we would be partners with him.

Let us see, that there can be no christian Life without a very great cost of the very best that we have. Then let us think of what it has cost others in making our christian Life possible. And last let us think of what our chris-

At best our personal posessions are very small, from whatever viewpoint we consider them. Our material wealth is very small. Mentally most of us are paupers. Morally most of us are bankrupt. Spiritually we are mortgaged beyond redemption. This situation demands our most serious thought and consideration. We are very much in need of an Elijah to come along weary, and thirsy, and hungry to tell us what to do that we may be

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rid of our poverty.

Let us learn from our text:-

- 1-That very often we should make an inventory of all our possessions.
- 2-That to the best of our ability, we should plan to make the best investment of our possessions.
- 3-That we should expect great results from our investments.
- 4-That we are never intelligent as to what to do with our possessions until we know the will of God.
- 5-That like Elijah, the church must be intelligent concerning God's program and make it known to the people.

Let us remember, that if we are God's servants, that we are his agents to do his will. It is ours to provide for the poor, feed the hungry and cloth the naked.

The harvest is past, the summer is ended, and we are not saved.

Every life has its spring, its summer, its fall and its winter. Each of these seasons has its own pleasures, its own joys and delights.

Not many of us get the full joy out of any one of these seasons. So those who are able extend their seasons by moving form place to place. Those in the South who wish more winter than their locality affords, like the wild geese go to the North, and those who wish their summers extended go to the South. Each season in the year stands for certain privileges, certain opportunities; and you can not get out of winter what God has intended that you should get out of the other seasons.

We usually consider the seasons of the year in this order: spring, summer, fall and winter. But at this time we shall change the order and begin with fall.

Fall is the season of ACCUMULATION, PRESERVATION.

Winter is the season of MEDITATION, SPECULATION, CONTEMPLATION and PLANNING.

Spring is the season of PREPARATION, DESIGNATION.

SUMMER to which we wish at this time to give special attention is the season of FERTILIZA*tion, EXAMINATION, INTRODUCTION, CULTIVAtion.

In connection with the summer of life there are several important things that we should consider:-

1-The Soil. How to fertilize it.

2-What the Examination means.

3-What is to be Introduced or Planted .

4-Who shall Introduce or Plant the seed?

5-What it means to Cultivate what has been intro-

to stand still. It is then God calls us up into the mount and delivers to us the laws, and commandments that we must learn and follow ourselves, and teach to our fellowmen with whom we are journeying, suffering, praying, and working.

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And Jesus entered and passed through Jericho. And behold, there was a man named Zacchaeus, which was the chief among the publicans, and he was rich. And he sought to see Jesus who he was; and could not for the press, for he was little of stature. And he ran before, and climbed up into a sycamore tree to see him: for he was to pass that way. And when Jesus came to the place, he looked up, and saw him, and said unto him, Zacchaeus, make haste, and come down; for to day I must abide at thy house. And he made haste, and came down, and received him jotfully. And when they saw it, they all murmured, saying, That he was gone to be guest with a man that is a sinner. And Zacchaeus stood, and said unto the Lord; Behold, Lord, the half of my goods I give to the poor; and if I have taken any thing from any man by false accusation. I restore him fourfold. And Jesus saidunto him, This day is salvation come to this house, forsomuch as he also is a son of Abraham. For the Son of man is come to seek and to save that which was lost.

This brief story of Zacchaeus is worthy of our serious consideration; for it may serve as a key to many difficult religious problems that we find in connection with many persons in the various walks of life.

True, from the viewpoint of his people, the Jews, he had no religion, nor religious thoughts, but was a sinner. Nevertheless our scripture lesson teaches us that he did have religious thoughts of the most serious and most vital kind.

His people were thinking about the ancient law and the traditions of tmen..But this man was thinking about and was anxious to see Jesus, who is the fulfilment of the law and greater than all tradition.

We may learn these lessons from this story of Zacchaeus:-

- 1-That the mind of the person who wishes to see Jesus and receive his blessing overcomes all physical handicaps.
- 2-That dignity of position and riches do not interfer with the man who really wishes to see Jesus.
- 3-That the man who really wishes to see Jesus runs ahead of the doubting, unbelieving crowd and takes up his place of vantage.

Dec. 16 '31 Isaiah 11:1-9 And there shall come forth a rod out of the stem of Jesse, and a Branch shall grow out of his roots; And the spirit of the Lord shall rest upon him, the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and of the fear of the Lord; And shall make him of quick understanding in the fear of the Lord; and he shall not judge after the sight of his eyes, neither reprove after the hearing of his ears; But with righteousness shall he judge the poor, and reprove with equity for the meek of the earth: And he shall smight the earth with the rod of his mouth, and with the breath of his lips shall he slay the wicked. And righteousness shall be the girale of his loins, and faithfulness of his reins. The wolf shall dwell with the lamb, and the leopard shall lie down with the kid; and the calf and the young lion and the fatling together; and a little child shall lead them. And the cow and the bear shall feed; their young ones shall lie down together: and the lion shall eat straw like the ox. And the sucking child shall play on the hole of the asp, and the weaned child shall put his hand on the cockatrice' den. They shall not hurt nor destroy in all my holy mountain; for the earth shall be full of the knowledge of the Lord as the waters cover the sea ...

Like all the ancient prophets, Isaiah passed through many periods of depression. Israel had lost power. She no longer looked to her great men for deliverance. But she did look foward to the coming of the Messiah who would deliver them from bondage and restore them to power. This expectancy was made the more intense by such message as has come to us this morning from the prophet Isaiah.

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Israel was concerned not alone with the religious life of their day, but with every phase of life. They looked foward to the coming of a great leader, that would revolutionize the world and inaugurate a reign that would be no less divine, but more humane, when man and beast would get a more favorable consideration.

713 years before the inauguration of this new reign things had become so reduced, and darkness was so prevalent, that it seemed almost rediculous and absurd to think of Isaiah's prophecy ever being fulfilled. But those of us who live today and are preparing to celebrate 1931st anniversary of the beginning of this reign of peace can tell much of what has transpired during the last 1900 that is proof positive of the fulfillment of the prophecy from which we have read this morning.

Dec. 20 '31 Isa. ll:L.C.7 M And the lion shall eat straw like

Types, signs, and symbols have always been used properly and intelligently to interpret the Messianic Kingdom to the people. For to a very few has been given to know the

mysteries of the Kingdom of God.

There are many signs, marks of the Messianic reign of peace. They are seen in the soil, in the sea and rivers, among the cattle of the fields and the beasts of the forest.

Those who are familiar with farm life know, that some farms indicate, represent prosperity, peace plenty and generosity. But some other farms indicate, represent scant, poverty, ill will and selfishness. On a good, well regulated farm, we know that some where there is an intelligent, industrious proprietor. Long before we see him we see many signs of his presence and power.

We are all anxious to know when we get into the territory of the Kingdom of God. And this we may know if we will watch the signs.

The real and final test of the christian religion is to be found in its ability to change the lion like life of the world.

It is not so much a question as to how the lamb and the child and the dove act under the influence of the Messianic reign? But rather how do the bear, the wolf, the leopard and the lion act under this influence?

Let us learn:-

- 1-That christianity engages to temper all life according to its needs.
- 2-That christianity takes the weak things of temporal life and makes them the standard of of superior spiritual life.
- 3-That christianity produces meekness, and hulmility and gives the spirit of sacrifice and service.

Where is he that is born King of the Jews?

These wise men under the guidance of a star had journeyed a long way in search for the new born King, Christ Jesus. And they had come into the vicinity of his birth place, but with certainty could proceed no further until they have gotten information from those who studied and knew the Word of God.

Evidently these wise men thought that the outstanding religious center(Jerusalem) of the Jews would be the most likely place in which to find their baby King. So they stopped at Jerusalem, and went to what they regarded, the places where they could most readily obtain the information that they desired about Jesus. But he had some men connected with his court who knew the Word of God. And they were able to give the desired information.
