

20.	HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:
	Typical vernacular Colonial Revival Style two family residence as adapted to a
	narrow urban Lot. Amherst Street, originally known as Ferry Street, was extended from Delaware Avenue to Main Street in 1875. The street follows Olmsted's
	original Plan for the Parkside subdivision as seen in the 1876 Sketch Map of
	the Park System. The land for subdivision was conveyed to the Parkside Land &
	Improvement Co., by Elam R. Jewett in November of 1885, at a cost of \$44,158.
	The land wast to be developed according to a subdivision map drawn up by
	Jewett with one stipulation, that a "factory for the manufacture of cement shall
	not be erected."
