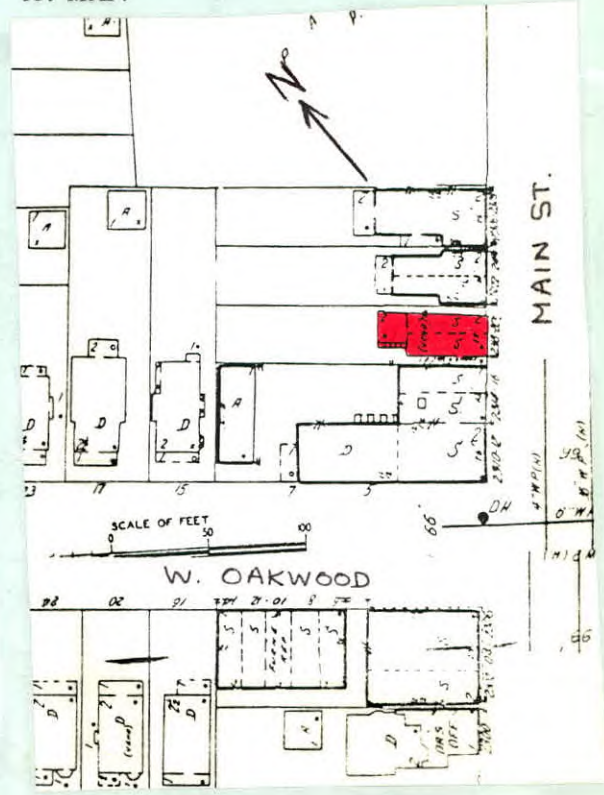

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

(Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)

Building is situated on a standard sized corner lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. It is located four blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):

Two story commercial/residential brick structure. Flat roof with parapet. First floor recessed entrance. Two glass paneled doors with transoms, flanked by large single-light glass windows. Paneled aprons. Brick piers. South end bay has glass and wood paneled door. Wood entablature with capping cornice spans first floor. Second floor semi-hexagonal hip roof oriel.

19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1909 Double-hung 1/1 light
windows. North end bay,
ARCHITECT: second floor, has 1/1
light window with lintel. Parapet with projecting
BUILDER: ends. Bossing caps parapet.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A typical brick commercial/residential structure. Originally the Buffalo and Williamsville Macadam Road, Main Street was a pre-existing street at the time Olmsted designated it as the eastern border for "The Parkside." While the streets within the subdivision were designed specifically to avoid commercial development, this portion of Main Street became a combination of commercial and residential structures. It was also a major thoroughfare into the city, allowing easy access to downtown from this suburban neighborhood.
