

Partial-width flat roof porch ith slender Doric columns supporting entablature with brackets nder cornice. Spindle balustrade. Double glass and wood aneled door. Two story polygonal corner tower with domical aneled finial. First floor windows, double sash with single DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: c. 1895

	BUILDER: second floor has pair 1/1 windows.
	HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A simplified version of thingle style residence. Summit Avenue is a truncated north-bouth street, located between Woodward and Crescent Avenues and extending from West Oakwood Place to the northern seciton of Crescent Avenue. A similar street, ending south of Jewett Avenue, appears in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." Summit Evenue was deeded to the city in 1889, except for the small section between Amherst and Crescent which was deeded in 1892. This street follows Olmsted's rule that it "not lead with special directness toward the town."
