Jan. 3 '36 TWELFTH ANNIVERSARY OF THE AVE. MICHIGAN AVE. BRANCH OF THE Y.M.C.A....

Mr. Chairman, Dr. Johnson, Mr. Jackson, and Friends:

The part that has been assigned me on this program tonight is one that very often is frought with many difficulties. For some times you do not know whom you are welcoming. Then there are times when you do not know to what to welcome one. But to night we have no such difficulties. For our honored guest is known, if not personally by a fine genuine reputation, throughout the length and breadth of this our country.

In welcoming Dr. Johnson tonight we do not hesitate on account of a lack of knowledge; for we know him and have known him as an exponent of civic righteousness. We have known him as a straight thinking theologian, and we have known him as an educator with more than platitudes and theories. We have known him to be an educator with the spirit of application and practice.

Therefore our part on the program tonight is a pleasure and privilege. And in this privilege the fountain of honor is opened to us, and in it we sip anew the cup of prestiege.

And our long sojourn here makes us think that we are in possession of a practical knowledge of our city. We know the COMMERCIAL life, the INDUSTRIAL life, the EDUCATIONAL life, the SOCIAL life, the DOMESTIC life and the RELIGIOUS life of Buffalo.

I have not been told to which one of these phases of Buffalo life I am to welcome Dr. Johnson, nor have I asked Dr. Johnson to what phase of Buffalo life does he wish a welcome. I would welcome you with the same earnestness and enthusiasm with which I am welcoming you now. For I know you would find enough in this building and its activities to make you comfortable and to interest you and to make you at ease while in our city. I know you are welcomed to the office of our Executive Secretary, Mr. Jackson, an alumnus of your own school.

Some men go to college, matriculate for a few years, and the faculty confer degrees upon them. But they go out into the world and are complete failures. But when you become a pupil under the Holy Spirit and Jesus confers a degree upon you, you can be certain that you are qualified to do the thing for which your degree stands. You can never be a failure so long as your Teacher is a success. For like the apostle Paul you can do all things through him who strengthens you.

So let us start out in this new year with the determination, under Christ, to do more than ever before to save ourselves and the world.

God's cause waits for those who HAVE to share with those who HAVE NOT. Have you VISICN, ZEAL, ENTHUSIASM in the cause that with others, you have espoused? Share it with others. Like your Lord, sancitify yourself that your brethren may be sanetified through the truth that they shall receive through you.

A feast, though prepared by Jesus has no appeal for those who are not hungry.

His provision is for all. But only those who are hungry, those who have no meat are invited. Many people are hungry, but do not know what their trouble is.

Like the disciples of our text there are those who have toiled all night, many nights and are tired and weary, and disheartened with their failures.

Jesus invites those who are hungry and lack ability to appease their hunger to come and dine.

Jesus invites those who are not so fastidious and technical as to wish to dictate the bill of fare that is to be served.

Jesus invites those to dine with him who will bring something to help to make the feast what he wishes it to be.

We are all mightily influenced by these two periods of time, Yesterday and To morrow.

But we should remember, that the christian life is a day by day life.

We must not be discouraged when we reflect upon the past, nor be too enthusiastic as we contemplate the future.

Our chance, our opportunity is not in yesterday nor in to morrow, but in to day.

Let us remember, that we get the best out of life when we go into these periods with Jesus. For all periods are the same with him.

As a rule the crowd is too busy taking care of their own scant supply of physical and moral health to give serious attention to those who are lepers, only to shun them.

Ofttimes the unclean leper is more in evidence in the worship of God than those who are regarded clean and free from leperousy; for often they remain away from the place of worship where God has promised to meet and bless.

The leper is in our midst. What are we going to do about it? What can we do about it?

Ofttimes the leper has more faith in Jesus than those who are regarded clean and free from leprousy.

The leper often manifests courage that those who are not lepers do not manifest.

Let us always have a place in our worship for the leper and the unclean.

Let us present Jesus in a way that will appeal to those who need him.

HE CAME UNTO HIS OWN AND HIS OWN RECEIVED HIM NOT.

Our relationships are established and controled by certain circumstances and conditions. We may be intimately related by one set of circumstances, and absolutely divorced by another set of circumstances.

Sometimes we make circumstances that relate us to another. Then there are circumstances over which we have no control that establish relationships for us.

According to race and blood Jesus was intimately related to those to whom he first came with his message of love, life and power. They were Jews so was he; they had descended from David so had he; they were subjects of the Roman government and paid tribute to Caesar, and he was a subject of the Roman government and paid tribute to Caesar; they attended and took part in the Synagogue worship; they read the literature of their fathers, and so did he; of Jerusalem they loved to sing, Peace be within thy walls and prosperity within thy palaces, and so did he. So we see that in consideration of all these facts Jesus had the right to think of those to whom he first brought his message as being peculiarly his own. And it would seem that these ties were sufficient to have caused them to have given to him a most enthusiastic reception. But our text tells us that they did not receive him at all.

A community may receive a great gift from a great benefactor. But many people in the community may never receive any benefit from the gift. And if they do not there are always reasons why they do not.

There are always many people in a community who know and care little or nothing about a great gift that may have come to their community.

Then it may be that those to whom the administering the gift has been entrusted have not done their whole duty. It may be that they have failed to publish the fact, that this great gift has come to the cummunity, and that it is for all to share.

And though the administrator has done his whole duty still there may be some who are so engrossed in inferior interests that they do not take time to listen to the administrator when he publishes the good news. Hence they do not know the value nor the signification of the gift.

So Jesus, God's Gift to this old world was not understood nor properly valued by any considerable number of the people, nor is he to this day. The great masses of those who claim that they have have received the Lord Jesus seem to have no proper conception of what they have received or of what the gift means and includes.

So those who do have the proper conception of Jesus are called upon, like St. John to proclaim to the world: that of the fulness of Jesus the entire community has received, and grace for grace.

It is difficult, yea it is impossible for poor depraved finite creatures, for carnally minded man to comprehend the greatness, the

the fulness of the Lord Jesus. For in him dwelleth all the fulness of the Godhead bodily. every divine virtue, every divine attribute are found in him.

And yet no one has ever been so liberal, so generous in giving himself as Jesus; so now we can say, Of his fulness have all we received,

To designate all the virtues that enter into the fulness of Christ is no easy task for the best of us. But we all know that every phase of his fulness is the need of the church and the need of us all.

Every age brings the church face to face with new and difficult problems. And we should know and understand these problems. So our first kneed is KNOWLEDGE. This we find in his fulness.

There are so many approaches to the problems with which the church finds herself face to face; there are so many methods that are being used by those who are endeavoring to solve them, that the church must have WISDOM so that she may choose the right method as she goes about to solve these problems. This wisdom we find in Jesus Christ.

Some times it takes so long to solve these problems, that the church needs PATIENCE to persevere, to keep on to the end. And this is found in the Master's fulness.

Oten God's method for solving the problems of life are greatly opposed, and the church needs COURAGE to carry on.. This is found in the fulness of Christ.

There is so much apathy among many groups that are working on the problems of life, that the church feels the need of being EARNEST and sincere

Cold law is some times so harsh and exacting, that it seems almost void MERCY and JUSTICE. The church knows that if she is to succeed in the solution of the problems of life

she must have JUSTICE always tempered with MERCY.

There are groups working on the problems of life that are so scientific and mechanical that seem almost void of LOVE. But the church knows that her greatest need is LOVE.

With this comprehensive conception of what the fulness of Christ means, may seek to have his fulness according to our capacity and our need.

IN HIM WAS LIFE; AND THE LIFE WAS THE LIGHT OF MEN. AND THE LIGHT SHINETH IN DARKNESS; AND THE DARK-COMPREHENDED IT NOT. YE ARE THE LIGHT OF THE WORLD.

In inaugurating his earthly program, Jesus emphasized no two words more that the words LIFE and LIGHT. And as he used them he gave to them a new meaning.

Up to the time that Jesus announced, that he was the LIGHT of the world, and the LIFE, men had thought of life and light, physical and spiritual as being the results of certain intellectual, scientific combinations.

Men had thought that stirct observance of physical and moral laws would bring to them life and light. They had not been accustomed to think of these great universal blessings in the one person, Christ Jesus, and that in order to have life and light abundant they must have him.

In the beginning man did think and rightly think that he needed to trust and depend upon God for his life and light. But after the adamic fall he drifted farther and farther away from that thought.

Jesus came to make men realize that they were in the dark and daed; and to make them realize that he was the only source of abundant life and light.

Darkness does not always mean sin, but sin is never symbolized by Light. Sin is often, as it is in our text, symbolized by darkness, and right-eousness is symbolized by Light. Then again, TRUTH, HONESTY and PURITY are never symbolized by darkness; but by Light.

Darkness and Light are in no way related;

they have no agreement, no fellowship.

Darkness is negative, but Light is always positive. They are so unalike that they can not work together, they can not live together.

Darkness is never at ease, never comfortable, and can not remain in the presence of Light. When Light appears, darkness always disappears.

May we always realize, that because the Lord is our abundant life, we are the light of the world; and that if this old is in darkness it is in large measure our fault.

The home is the place where the first principles of all these phases of life should be learned and practiced:

> ECONOMICS, and INDUSTRIALISM. Our POLITICAL LIFE. Our EDUCATIONAL LIFE. Our SOCIAL, MORAL, and RELIGIOUS LIFE.

May we give more prayerful attention to the VALUE of our families.

AFTER LONG ABSTINENCE PAUL STOOD FORTH IN THE MIDST OF THEM, AND SAID, SIRS, YE SHOULD HAVE HEARK-ENED UNTO MR, AND NOT HAVE LOOSED FROM CRETE, AND TO HAVE GAINED THIS HARM AND LOSS.

Paul, possibly, the best friend his people, the Jews had; and surely their greatest benefactor, was so misunderstood, and his religious activities so misinterpreted by his people, that they became his greatest enemies. And by indifference or by open opposition worked against him, and finally had him imprisoned.

When he was brought into court and tried before Judge Festus he saw that his people were making it impossible for him to get justice in that court and he appealed to the supreme court which sitting at Rome under Judge Caesar.

And when the time came for Paul to the supreme court at Rome Judge Festus had him with a number of other prisoners put onto a ship. But they had not sailed very long when they encountered exceeding rough weather. The weather was so very bad, that the entire crew, including the captain did not know what to do, whether to continue the voyage or to remain in the harbor of Crete.

Now Paul, though a prisoner, had more power and prestiege with God than all the rest that were on the ship. And he had knowledge from God as to what was going to happen. He knew that if they loosed from the harbor of Crete that they would be wrecked, and told them so. But those in charge of the ship did not believe Paul nor attach any importance to his counsel and advice. So they sailed on, but very soon met just the disaster that Paul had foretold. Under these circumstances Paul speaks to them the words of our text.

May we be alive to the fact that the man of God is the most powerful agency in all the world. And that it is the privilege of every one of us to be the kind of man of God about which I have been talking. And let us by God's help be the kind of men of God who know him and his will and his way.

I think we all must confess, that the very best of us have a very poor, meager conception of God's bounty.

Whether we think of his material or his spiritual supply constantly we are made to see that we have not even tapped the great sources of his supply in Wisdom, Knowledge and Truth, and Understanding.

HE IS DISPISED AND REJECTED OF MEN.

These words of the prophet give a perfect description of Jesus according to the conception of one class of men men who have never sat at the feet of the Holy Spirit, the great teacher, how to see Jesus in his true light must always have a warped conception, an erroneous idea of him. But there is another description of Jesus according to another class of men-men who have been trained to recognize the genuine, the real true beauty.

The first class of men never see anything in Jesus to be admired. To them is uncomly, dispised and rejected.

To the other class of men is is always the rose of Sharon, the lily of the valley, the bright and morning star. To them he is the fairest among ten thousand and altogether levely.

It seems almost inconceivable that there could be two classes from the same people with ideas of Jesus so diametrically opposed to one another. But it has always been so, and is to this day. By some he is received and they are granted power to become sons of God. By others he is disallowed, cast out, dispised and rejected.

There have always been those who have been made uncomfortable, uneasy by the presence of Jesus, and have wanted to know why he had come to torment them before the time, and have besought him to depart out of theeir territory. But there have been also, always those who have found their supreme joy and delight in him, and have besought him to abide with them.

There are always two conceptions and therefore two attitudes towards all the world's great characters and great movements.

Isa. 53:F.C.3

No community, no people, individual rejects any great character in toto. There are always some qualities, some traits, usually the ones that the character cares the least about are recognized and received by the people. But if the character is not recognized for what he comes to be and do the recognition that he does receive is equivalent to rejection.

When here in the flesh, Jesus was rejected where he was needed most and by those who needed him most. And the same is true today.

Jesus was never more needed than he is to-day in our DOMESTIC life, our SOCIAL life, IN-DUSTRIAL life, our ECONOMIC life, our POLITICAL life, our INTELLECTUAL life, our RELIGIOUS life.

May we remember his words and realize that he knew what he was talking about when he said, And I if I be lifted up from the earth I will draw all men unto me.

Let us be comforted in the fact that in all the encouraging assuring things that Jesus said about himself may rest our hope as an anchor of the soul both sure and steadfast.

Constantly we are being called upon to read or listen to reports from the various departments of the world's activities. Reports come from the field of SOCIOLOGY, the field of PSYCHOLOGY, from the field of EDUCATION, from the field of INDUSTRY and ECONOMICS, from the field of POLITICS and CIVIC ENDEAVOR and from the field of MORALITY and RELIGION.

Not one of these reports has in it the ring of optimism and certainty, but rather that of doubt, fear and pessimism, And this condition prevails in the church in no less an agravated form than it does in the world.

Most of us like Thomas of old are in the church and a part of it, but we live under a cloud, we journey over a way that is dark and gloomy. We do not see nor hear as we should the things that encourage and inspire.

The great need of us all is to hear the report from the other disciples, the other disciples who have seen and listened to the one who speaks not as the scribes and pharisees, but as one having authority.

We spend so much time looking at and listening to ourselves that we do not take time to see our Lord and hear him speak saying peace be unto you.

Let us all strive to be among the other disciples who have seen the Lord.

JESUS CHRIST THE SAME YESTERDAY, AND TO DAY AND FOR EVER.

The great principles of life are like God: they do not change, they are eternal. But methods are like man: they change.

Physical change, Mental change, and Spiritual change are in evidence every where, all the time when man is considered. Man is made to change, and if he do not change he becomes a dwarf. Growth means change. This is as true in spiritual life as in any other phase of life. Here is where many with the very best intentions stumble. They try in an ever changing world to adjust themselves to the words of the text. They think if Christ is the same yesterday, to day and for ever, that they too must be the same.

The thought for our consideration at this time is:

THE PROBLEM OF ADJUSTMENT

The problem of life, indeed life itself is how to afjust oneself to his environment. We are not concerned about adjusting ourselves to every thing or to every body. But we are concerned about, and are anxious to adjust ourselves to the great programs, and the great personalities in which are tied up the great issues of life. And our problem is how to do this; what method, what technique shall we use. This is difficult in whatever way the problem may present itself, whether with the aspect of the vacillating or with the aspect of the static.

If we do not like change, to adjust ourselves to a changing world is not easy. It really becomes a problem that is not easily solved. But on the other hand, we like change, if we like to be in the whirl and current of life then it is not easy for us to adjust ourselves to programs or persons that are static.

Our text presents to us a person in whom

all the fulness of the Godhead bodily dwells, and he is the way the truth and the life. For christians all the issues of life are found in him. And if we make him our key to the problems of life the problem of adjustment will become practical and easy. If we allow him to shape us we will fit into every situation so as to be helpful. If we go into the battles of life with him we will come out victorious.

Let us adjust ourselves to him who is the same yesterday, to day and for ever, and we shall find it easy to adjust ourselves to all persons and programs that are worthwhile.

BUT BE YE DOERS OF THE WORD, AND NOT HEARERS ONLY, DECEIVING YOUR OWN SELVES. FOR IF ANY BE A HEARER OF THE WORD, AND NOT A DOER, HE IS LIKR UNTO A MAN BEHOLDING HIS NATURAL FACE IN A GLASS: FOR HE BEHOLDETH HIMSELF, AND GOETH HIS WAY, AND STRAIGHTWAY FORGETTETH WHAT MANNER OF MAN HE WAS.

Deceit, in whatever way it may be used, is always dangerous and destructive. And this is particularly true when practised upon oneself.

Physicians have many ways to test the body to determine in what condition we are. in,

But the great Physician alone can test the mind, the spirit to determine the condition of the soul. And in doing so he uses his Son as the standard. The rule that we are to follow in our endeavor to measure up to this standard is found in the word of God, and nowhere else. But we can not know this rule only as we humbly place ourselves under the great teacher, the Holy Spirit.

The physician examins us diagnoses our case, and then prescribes the remedy. Whether we benefit by the remedy depends upon using it and using it according to directions.

examine us for He knows our condition and has given us the remedy.

But physician not only gives the patient medicine, but he prescribes a certain diet, and certain kinds of exercise.

The great Physician not only prescribes for us the WORD, the remedy for all our spiritual ills, but tells us definitely when where and how to use the word.

If we would follow the Lord Jesus we must be prepared to occupy many places and to do a great variety of things.

Let us not be so much concerned about where we are in the service of the Lord. But may we seek to know that we are following the Lord Jesus.

To many slavery ceases to be a burden, a torture. They think not of nor do they look forward to anything better. And this is especially true when a change means independence and new responsibilities.

The church must continue to disturb-torment the SOCIAL order until evil and unrighteousness lose their hold upon the people.

The ECONOMIC-INDUSTRIAL, and the MORAL, the RELIGIOUS order must be disturbed-tormented until it is purified.

EXODUS 20:21

AND THE PEOPLE STOOD AFAR OFF, AND MOSES DREW NEAR UNTO THE THICK DARKNESS WHERE GOD WAS.

The journey from man-to God is always over a way that is dreary, dark and gloomy; and God seems far away enshroused in darkness. And this is overcome only by those who have faith and courage to continue the journey to the end. And they find, that no darkness can abide where God dwells.

The great weakness of the church today was typified by ancient Israel, who in their great religious activities stood afar off.

Moses was a great leader because he took time to seek God, get acquainted with him and his program. But Moses was a great leader not alone because he knew God and his program, but because he knew the prople and their need. Moses knew that the people needed to know the nature of God, and how and where he was to be found. They needed to learn that God did not exist simply for himself nor for a few select ones. But for them and for every one. They were to fear God, but not with a cringing retiring fear. But they were to fear God with a fear actuated by love and revrence. They needed to learn, that with God there was no reason why some men should stay far away from him while others drew near. Tith God every man might be his own high priest and enter into the Holy of Holies for himself.

As in Moses' day so today in matters religious. The leaders who are earnest and enthusiastic are lonely most of the time as they go to front where God is.

It is not difficult to see that there is a great gulf between the leaders and the followers; between the laity and the church today that of the church. There is a feeling too prevalent in the church today that the work of inspiring and edifying the people rests exclusively upon the clergy. And this condition prevails not alone in our ritualistic churches, but in the evangelical churches as well. So long as the rank and file of the people are afraid to hear the voice of God and stand afar off there can be no real progress.

But we know the laymen is not altogether responsible for this situation. For many leaders, like Moses seem to feel that they alone are the only ones who are qualified to go, if need be, into the thick darkness where God is.

the minister establishes his own private line between himself and God the rank and file of the church will continue to stand afer off weak and ignorant of God's program.

CHOOSE YOU THIS DAY WHOM YE

The word SERVICE is a magic word. Just the mentioning of it awakens certain emotions as no other word. This word brings to us memories many of them pleasant and many of them unpleasant. And all of this is especially true concerning our racial group.

Certain outstanding individuals have always stood for-represented great appealing CAUSES. And in all ages it has been the business of the human race and especially our racial group to choose some one- some cause that they might conscientiously SERVE.

It is the ambition of every normal man woman and child to serve some one— some cause. And this has been especially true since the Master's pronouncement, that the one who serves is greatest. For every one wishes to be great.

Whether as individuals or as a group, in the infancy of our experience we need coaching-training that we may become intelligent concernthe persons and causes that bid for our service.

Hence we select schools and teachers to train us and put before us the persons and causes that are worthy and demand our support and service.

There have been periods in the history of the human race, and of our race in particular, when we did not have much if any choice as to whom and what we should serve. Those were days when the race was in its infancy and had only childish thoughts or no thoughts at all about God and his Cause.

But when the days of childhood had passed they put away childish things and began to think like men, and to make choices like men. It was in such a period in the history of Israel. It that they were appealed to in the language of our text to choose whom they would serve.

There comes a period in the life of every one of us when in all things worthwhile we must make a choice.

May we use every means that has been placed at our disposal to make ourselves intelligent as to what choices to make in the great issues of life.

We need to take more of our worthwhilm affairs into the house of the Lord and as did Hezekiah, pray to God about them.

As they went to Hezekiah even so men come to us with all kinds of messages, messages discouraging and disheartening. As they told Hezekiah they tell us that we are ancient and back numbers because we believe God is and that he is a rewarder of those who diligently seek him.

If we would be encouraged, we must remember, that even though the enemy has many messengers, that God has some too who have never bowed their knee to Baal. It is ours to tune our hearts and ears to hear them. For their messages are full of promise and hope.

THE CHIEF PRIESTS ANSWERED, WE HAVE NO KING BUT CAESAR. HE SAVED OTHERS; HIMSELF HE CANNOT SAVE.

In the days of the Master's carthly career the chief priests of Israel had become so narrow and dwarfed in their religious conception that they had no capacity for light, life or truth.

The chief priests, who typified the masses of the people of today had capacity only for Caesar and that for which Caesar atands.

They said right that Jesus saved others and himself he could not save. For that was true so far as they were concerned. He could not save himself according to their idea of salvation.

Today the mass of people are more concerned about who shall reign over their material possessions than they are about who shall reign over their spiritual destinies.

Let us remember, that if we are following in the steps of our Lord we must be concerned not so much about saving ourselves, but about saving others, with the assurance that God will care for our salvation.

Let us remember, that Jesus could not use the methods that were used by the Caesars for saving himself, because the part of man in which the Caesars were most interested Jesus practically ignored. Jesus was willing to lay down his life that he might show his power in taking it again.
