

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)

Building is situated on a standard sized corner lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located two blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):

Hip roof Colonial Revival. The truncated hip roof has a palladian window dormer in front with gable over center arched window. Facade cornice overhang is supported by three carved acanthus leaf modillions. Corner boards are fluted ionic pilasters. Porch is supported by slender doric columns with the Adamesque <u>SIGNIFICANCE</u> delicacy of design. Doorway has leaded glass transom 19. 20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A finely detailed example of the hip roof Colonial Revival in the Parkside area. Crescent Avenue is the longest curvilinear street in the Parkside subdivision, stretching from Humboldt Avenue to Colvin Street. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent Avenue had been modified by Olmsted to its current form. Portions of the street were deeded to the city by five different owners over a span of five years, beginning in 1887 near Humboldt and ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins and ends within the Parkside subdivision, following Olmsted's rule that a suburban neighborhood street "not lead with special directness toward the town."
