

Partial-width enclosed porch has brick piers with capital ornamentation of stone, Glass paneled door with top pane having 6 lights. Side-lights 4/1. Three part window has 4/1 lights. Stucco bay window has 8/1 center window and 4/1 end windows. Second floor stucco. 8/1 windows with shutters. Shed dormer IGNIFICANCE tri-part 6/1 windows. West side-1912 has second floor oriel. 	This American Four Square with Craftsman Style influence was built for Edward C. Cursons, Assistant Treasurer of the Buffalo General Electric Co. and Buffalo Niagara Electric Power Corp. at an approximate cost of \$5,000. The street reflects Olmsted's philosophy regarding roadways within a subdivision; the street is a broad long roadway with no intersecting thoroughfares, running east to west "with no special directness toward the town." The streets picturesque character is a plan
