

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)
Building is situated on a standard sized corner lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located one block from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.
18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story American Four Square. Hip roof with exposed roof rafters under eave. First floor full-width enclosed wing. Horizontal band of 6/1 windows. Rough-cut, regular course stone base. Second story has a set of paired 6/1 windows. South side has entrance porch. Square paneled supports. Stick balustrade.
Wood paneled door with leaded sidelights. Windows 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1909 are 10/1 light. Hip roof dormer with exposed rafter
ARCHITECT: tails under flared eave. Two 6/1 light windows.
BUILDER:
20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: Typical American Four Square. Woodward Avenue runs parallel to Parkside Avenue and extends from Humboldt Avenue to the northwest portion of Crescent Avenue. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside," although it is less curvilinear than originally planned. Portions of Woodward Avenue (originally called Davis Avenue) were deeded to the city by five different owners between 1887 and 1892; except for the section north of Amherst, this was done when comparable sections of Crescent Avenue were deeded. Following Olmsted's rule for a suburban street, Woodward Avenue does "not lead with special directness toward town."
