

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:
(Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district) Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located two blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and east of the Zoo.
Two and a half story with Colonial Revival style influence. Side gable roof with projecting front facing gable. Full-width flat roof porch with projection over stairs. Paired slender square supports. Stick balustrade. Glass paneled door flanked on one side by 6/1 window. Three part first floor window; 8/1 light SIGNIFICANCE center with 6/1 light sides. Second floor has 10 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION:c. 1896 light porch door flanked on one side by two 8/1
ARCHITECT: windows. Window shutters.
Entablature spans entire building. Gable has pair BUILDER: recessed 6 over 1 windows.
20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A frame residential structure with a minimum application of Colonial Revival styling. Summit Avenue is a truncated north-south street, located between Woodward and Crescent Avenues and extending from West Oakwood Place to the northern section of Crescent Avenue. A similar street, ending south of Jewett Avenue, appears in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." Summit Avenue was deeded to the city in 1889, except for the small section between Amherst and Crescent which was deeded in 1892. This street follows Olmsted's rule that it "not lead with special directness toward the town."
