

House is located one block from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.
18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story American Four Square. Hip roof with rafter tails under extending eaves. Full-width porch. Recessed entrance. 4 light wood door. First and second floor single light windows with diamond tracery in transom. Second floor has elliptical window stained glass with keystones. Hip roof dormer with SIGNIFICANCE Casement dormer window

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: Typical American Four Square. Woodward Avenue runs parallel to Parkside Avenue and extends from Humboldt Avenue to the northwest portion of Crescent Avenue. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside," although it is less curvilinear than originally planned. Portions of Woodward Avenue (originally called Davis Avenue) were deeded to the city by five different owners between

1887 and 1892; except for the section north of Amherst, this

was done when comparable sections of Crescent Avenue were deeded.
