Building is situated on a standard sized corner lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located two blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Colonial Revival house. The large truncated hip roof has paired pedimented dormers on each elevation. Classical scroll broken-pediment over doorway. Oval leaded-glass window near doorway. Small porch on corner has been rebuilt but one ionic capital column remains from earlier design.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A large and once imposing Colonial Revival house designed for a corner lot. Crescent Avenue is the longest curvilinear street in the Parkside subdivision, stretching from Humboldt Avenue to Colvin Street. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent Avenue had been modified by Olmsted to its current form. Portions of the street were deeded to the city by five different owners over a span of five years, beginning in 1887 near Humboldt and ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins and ends within the Parkside subdivision, following Olmsted's rule that a suburban neighborhood street "not lead with special directness toward the town."
