

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located four blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story Craftsman style. Side gable roof with wedge-shaped brackets under extending eaves. Partial-width shed roof porch. Extending eave. Rough cut irregular course stone. Double glass paneled doors. Four-part casement windows with diamond shaped tracery flanking wood panel. First floor rough cut irregular coursed stone. Double-hung windows. Three vertical

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: supported by brackets. Exposed A good example brackets under eaves. Two double hung windows. Three of the vernacular vertical lights in top light. Second floor double-hung formal version of windows. 4 vertical lights in top light. Louvred Craftsman style. window shutters. Gable has small rectangular lights. Originally the Shed roof dormer with three 9 light windows.

Williamsville Macadam Road, Main Street was a pre-existing street at the time Olmsted designated it as the eastern border for "The Parkside." While the streets within the subdivision were designed specifically to avoid commercial development, this portion of Main Street became a combination of commercial and residential structures. It was also a major thoroughfare into
