

Ave and the sou of exceeded	HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A good example of a macular version of Prairie School style residence. Summit enue is a truncated north-south street, located between Woodward Crescent Avenues and extending from West Oakwood Place to e northern section of Crescent Avenue. A similar street, ending ath of Jewett Avenue, appears in Olmsted's early 1870's maps "The Parkside." Summit Avenue was deeded to the city in 1889, cept for the small section between Amherst and Crescent which was eded in 1892. This street follows Olmsted's rule that it "not ad with special directness toward the town."
