ABOUT HENRIK IBSEN'S WRITING . . .

Whatever I have written has been without any conscious thought of making propaganda. I have been more poet and less social philosopher than people generally seem inclined to believe. I . . . must disclaim the honor of having consciously worked for the women's rights movement. I am not even quite clear as to just what this women's rights movement really is. To me it has seemed a problem of humanity in general. And if you read my books carefully you will understand this. True enough it is desirable to solve the problem of women's rights, along with all the others; but that has not been the whole purpose. My task has been the description of humanity.

The words are the words of actuality, but the drift of the words, something beyond this. There is the powerful impression of unseen forces closing in upon the place.

Ibsen succeeded in doing what every major playwright had attempted after the end of the seventeenth century and what even Goethe and Wagner had not wholly accomplished: he created a new mythology and the theatrical conventions with which to express it. . . .

He made the precariousness of modern beliefs and the absence of an imaginative world order his starting point. Man moves naked in a world bereft of explanatory or conciliating myth. Ibsen's dramas presuppose the withdrawal of God from human affairs, and that withdrawal has left the door open to cold gusts blowing in from a malevolent though inanimate creation. But the most dangerous assaults upon reason and life come not from without. . . . They arise in the unstable soul. Ibsen proceeds from the modern awareness that there is rivalry and unbalance in the individual psyche. The ghosts that haunt his characters are not the palpable heralds of damnation whom we find in Hamlet and Macbeth. They are the forces of disruption that have broken loose from the core of the spirit. Or, more precisely, they are cancers growing in the soul. In Ibsen's vocabulary, the most deadly of these cancers is "idealism," the mask of hypocrisy and self-deception with which men seek to guard against the realities of social and personal life. When "ideals" seize upon an Ibsen character, they drive him to psychological and material ruin. . . . Once the mask has grown close to the skin, it can be removed only at suicidal cost. . . . When the mask no longer shields her against the light, Hedda Gabler kills herself.



unidentified New York paper Hedda is not hysterical. It is natural that actresses would wish to find an objective expression for the mystery of Hedda's nature. They cannot merely stand there, delivering her brilliant lines. They wonder what she is like alone, in private. And there it is usual to imagine her being more frank with herself than others. Alone, face to face with whatever she is face to face with, she is likely to moan and wring her hands, to show her inner distress, her desperation. This is wrong for Hedda just as it is meaningless for Nora. The hysterical gestures so often seen in the acting out of Ibsen's heroines are a way — secretive, on the sly, as it were - of trying for a clear and neat motivation the author does not wish to provide. Hysterical feeling and silent desperation create a sympathy, a surrounding of attractive feminine weaknesses, pitiable, searing, but not very serious. It would seem to be the only motivations we can imagine embodying. Alone, what would Hedda do? Nothing, perhaps. She is immensely idle and the idle do not wring their hands. . . . There is a waywardness in her never to be explained, and yet it does not seem unreal, incredible. Hedda is real enough, tangled, knotted rather than truly complex. We cannot find the force in her that might have prospered under a different sun because her force, her presence, are very much contained in all those defects and compulsions out of which Ibsen has created her. She is not the flower of environment. but rather of inner essence.

Elizabeth Hardwick

Hedda is a number to beware. Yes, she's suicidal, but that doesn't mean she's in agony. She just lacks that superattachment to life most of us take for granted. The idea of death comes very easily to her. People always ask, why does she marry Tesman? It's not because that's her only solution. There may be only three men in the play, but not in Oslo. The reason is that she knows she's going to die — so in the meantime she's just letting life happen, letting it come.


Hedda has invited portrayal as high tragedy, as pyrotechnic melodrama, as absurdist farce, as psychopathological document, as Marxist indictment, as feminist tract. She has been sentimentalized into a 'good person," a misunderstood victim, and trivialized into a transvestite selfportrait of the artist. Faced with all these partial perspectives, one should begin by simply reaffirming her irreducible, manysided humanity and, as well, the truth of an observation by Henry James on Ibsen: "His subject is always, like the subjects of all first-rate men, primarily an idea." The idea is incarnate in, not a role, but an entire play, and only attention to the ensemble of which Hedda is but one part will reveal it.

NEXT ON STAGE: 1988-89 SEASON A Few Words From David Frank

In the summer of 1983, browsing through a copy of *London Theatre Record*, I came across a set of extraordinarily enthusiastic notices for a play I'd never heard of: MEN SHOULD WEEP by Ena Lamont Stewart. The normally acerbic and argumentative London theatre critics reacted to this play with such unguarded praise that they lapsed, uncharacteristically, into the language every promoter dreams of — "triumphant," "devastating truth," "brilliant," and "deeply moving" echoed the headlines.

Surprisingly, MEN SHOULD WEEP never did move to Broadway as one would expect. However, it will finally receive the American premiere it deserves as the opening production of Studio Arena Theatre's 1988-89 season. It is, in a sense, a wonderfully naive work. Written, apparently in just two days. in 1946 by an unknown minister's daughter, it has no philosophical pretensions, no grand scheme. Set in Glasgow during the Depression, it portrays the struggle of family life, under conditions of appalling poverty, from a woman's point of view. It does so with great humor, honesty and unusual perception. It is, in the best sense, an elemental and totally innocent piece, freshly observed and deeply felt.

This same quality of innocence is characteristic of our second and third productions scheduled for next year. For the holiday season we will present Robert Harling's remarkable first play, STEEL MAGNOLIAS. Although much more raucously comic than MEN SHOULD WEEP, it derives its strength from similarly honest and perceptive observation. Set in a beauty shop in a small town in Louisiana, Mr. Harling's play is also without pretension

but he knows his characters so well and paints their qualities — both ludicrous and endearing — so vividly, that audiences have no choice but to surrender to their idiosyncratic charm. And comedy or not, they are eventually moved by the generosity and courage of this all-female cast as they face the commonplace triumphs and tragedies of any small town.


Between these two naturalistic works, we will sandwich a musical, THE BOY FRIEND, that is, arguably, about innocence itself. Set just a decade before MEN SHOULD WEEP, it is a gentle spoof on the artifice of the musical comedies of the 1920's. Miraculously, not only charm but a simple power emerges from its very ingenuousness. The music reminds me of cockney songs artlessly — and more or less tunefully — celebrated in the pubs of London with the help of quantities of warm beer. Songs sung for the joy of singing, without regard for an audience.

The first half of next season, three plays with accessible, old-fashioned stories will be dedicated to a kind of theatrical innocence that should in no way be confused with shallowness, but is, on the contrary, one of the foundations of theatre magic.

The second half of our season will see a marked change. Peter Shaffer's THE ROYAL HUNT OF THE SUN, Athol Fugard's THE ROAD TO MECCA, and Tina Howe's PAINTING CHURCHES are all very sophisticated plays. Lack of space precludes an introduction to these three plays — the sophisticated half of our season — but I will give them their due in a future article.
