

(Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)  Building is situated on a standard sized corner lot within  Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located two blocks  from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and east of the Zoo.
18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Three story with Prairie School and Craftsman styling. Roof proper, hip with flared projecting eaves. Exposed rafter tails. Ends have bargeboard adorned with structural details of rafter tails. Full- size, over-scale, gabled dormer. Flared eaves with exposed rafter tails. Bargeboard imitates roof proper. Paired windows, leaded.  SIGNIFICANCE  Building end has stone exposed chimney on first and
SIGNIFICANCE 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1910 second floor. First floor full-width hip roof porch has
ARCHITECT: stone irregular coursed end piers. Curved span between supports. Exposed rafter tails under eave. Band of BUILDER: single light windows, with transom. First floor fluted end pilaster strips. Second floor has two hip roof  10. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: boxed bays. Exposed rafter tails under eaves. 8/1 light windows. Clapboard first floor, shingle second floor. Side hip roof entrance porch. Square stone columns. Recessed entrance.
A fine example of Prairie School and Craftsman styling with unusual feature of over-size gabled dormer. Summit Avenue is a truncated north-south street, located between Woodward and Crescent Avenues and extending from West Oakwood Place to the northern section of Crescent Avenue. A similar street, ending south of Jewett Avenue, appears in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." Summit Avenue was deeded to the city in 1889, except for the small section between Amherst and Crescent which was deeded in 1892. This street 21. SOURCES: follows Olmsted's rule that it "not lead with special directness toward the town."
